TAX-PAYING TIME IS APPROACHING!

Schedules of Personal Property Must Be in Before May 15

Every Lake County taxpayer may be compelled to pay a 1 per cent monthly delinquent tax penalty if the "letter of the law" governing tax Banquet to Be Given collections is enforced, County Treasurer Jay Morse and County Clerk Lew Hendee stated this week before the county board of supervisors.

for the 1 per cent per month penalty which the law requires for all taxes paid after May 1, the county officials say.

But since County Treasurer Morse must mail out 120,000 tax bills to tion the taxpayers during the next week, land Park, and adjacent suburbs, it will be impossible to begin tax collections before the date for imposing the legal penalty.

> County Clerk Hendee said the tax legally turn the books over to the ounty treasurer because of bond difficulties. Mr. Hendee, who is an attorney, presented to the board a legal opinion from Attorney General Otto Kerner, stating that it was necessary for the county treasurer to post bonds for state funds.

But, Mr. Hendee contended, since no state tax would be paid this spring, there was no necessity for posting a bond to guarantee state

The county board later voted to authorize Mr. Hendee to proceed with the collection of the taxes without posting a state bond this year, inasmuch as the other funds will be protected by other bonds.
