

Local Legion Post to Foster Americanism in This Community

Although the powers in Washington are endeavoring to suppress all anti-communistic endeavor, the American Legion with Edward Hayes, national commander, taking the lead, is girding for battle against Moscow. And at the same time, unless it mends its ways immediately, against the socialistically inclined administration.

It might be well at this time to review the preamble to the constitution of the American Legion, to understand why we cannot condone or approve this radical change that is taking place.

The preamble: "For God and country, we associate ourselves together for the fol-

lowing purposes: To uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States of America; to maintain law and order; to foster and perpetuate a one hundred per cent Americanism; to preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the great war; to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state, and nation, to combat the autocracy of both the classes and the masses; to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy; to consecrate and sanctify our comradeship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness."

At the last meeting of Dumaresq Spencer Post No. 145, Commander Harold Bridges appointed a committee of three to promote Americanism, as follows: Dr. H. B. Roberts, Oliver E. Weed and H. B. Aiston, each of whom is ably qualified to

fill this important office. It will be the duty of these three to inform the public on the past history and connections of speakers who are to appear on the platforms of the various clubs and associations meeting in Highland Park, not to keep the people from going to hear these speakers, but that they might be able to read between the lines.

It will be the function of this committee to contact patriotic speakers and bring them to Highland Park. The first such speaker who will appear at the next regular meeting of this post will be Ronald Bradley who is Americanism officer of the Cook County Council and also a member of the American Committee of the Department of Illinois.

However, you need have no fear that he will lock it against you on

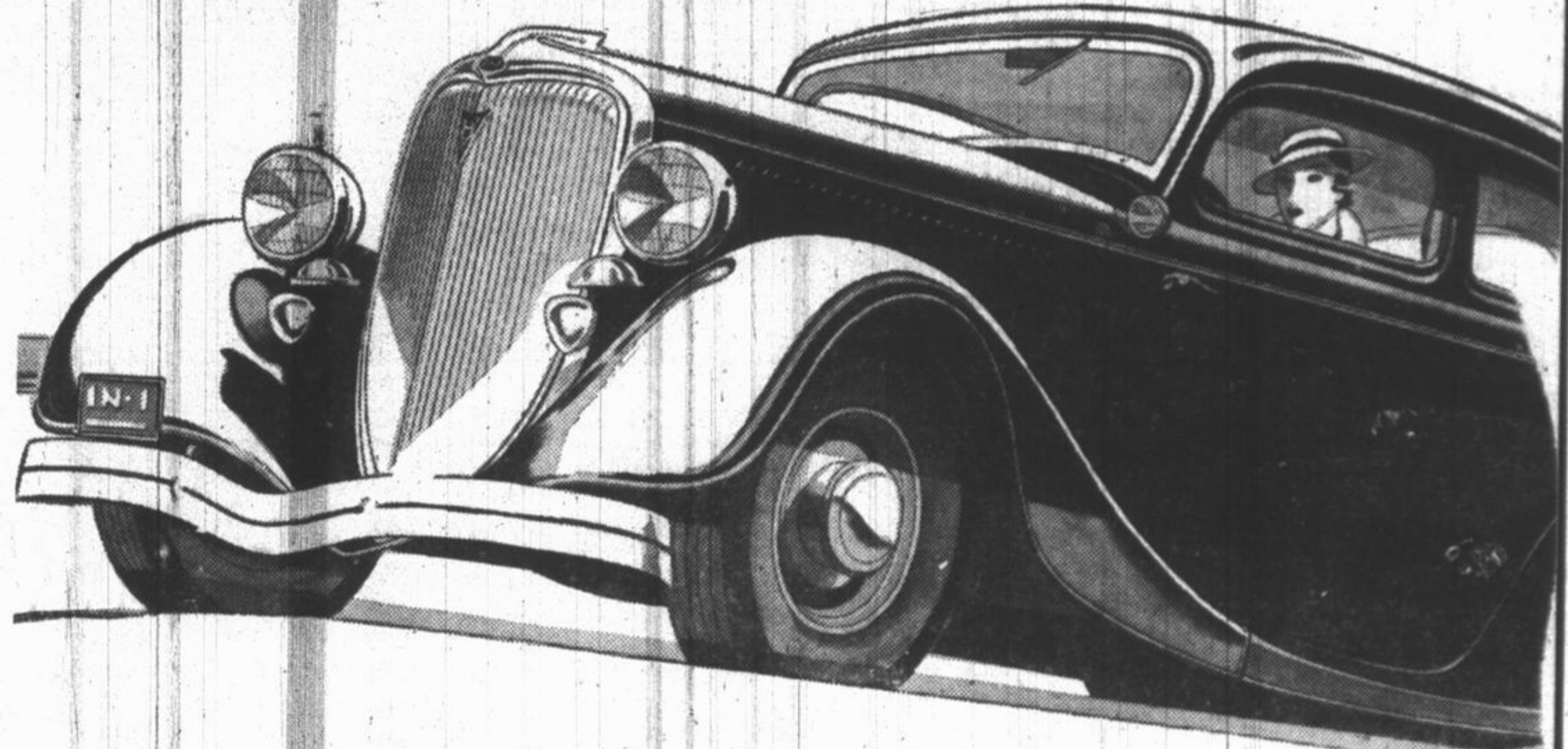
the evening of May 8, for Jenkins is a well-trained butler, and he has had instructions to admit whoever may come—count, or no 'count.
