

### Public Invited to Aid in National Honor of Florence Nightingale

The Veterans Administration Facility, North Chicago, will observe Hospital Day, Saturday, May 12, and will hold "open house" from 2 to 4 p.m. at which time the entire hospital will be open for inspection. National Hospital Day is observed by civilian and government hospitals in commemoration of the anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale, founder of modern hospital nursing.

Visitors will be directed to the recreational auditorium where they will be received by the ladies of the American Legion Auxiliary, 8th District, Department of Illinois, who will serve tea. Guides will be available for a tour of the hospital.

The primary object of Hospital Day is to familiarize the general public with all of the activities within a hospital in order that they may be fully informed as to the service rendered the community. This is accomplished by throwing open the doors of the hospitals and all of their departments and giving full information on all details of hospital management.

The Veterans Administration extends a cordial invitation to the public to visit their hospitals on National Hospital Day and it is hoped that as many as possible will visit the facility at North Chicago.

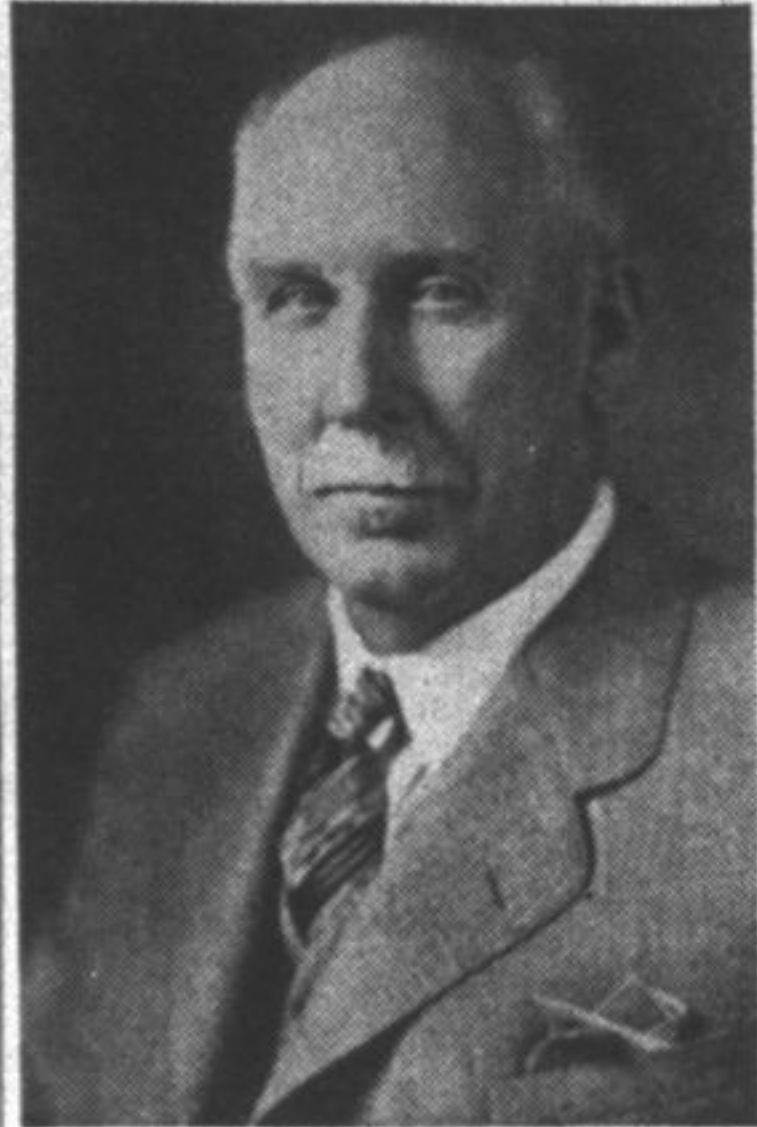

### Edward V. Price, 78, Dies in Hospital in Chicago Last Sunday

Edward Valentine Price, president and founder of Ed. V. Price & Co., wholesale tailors, died of pneumonia Sunday at the Passavant Memorial Hospital in Chicago at the age of 78 years.

Mr. Price was born in Savannah, Mo., May 9, 1856 where he received his education. Early in life the lure of the West took him to California and later to Nevada and Oregon where he was successively employed on a cattle ranch, in the silver mines, on the overland stage line and as a Wells-Fargo messenger and route agent. Later he became the travel-

ing representative in the West for A. N. Schuster & Co., then a thriving clothing concern of St. Joseph, Mo. After several years he represented in the same capacity A. R. Rothschild & Bro. of Chicago.

A man of amazing physical energy and gifted with an unusual personality, he made many lasting friendships and back in the days when clothing salesmen carried many trunks, worked long hours, with many miles of tedious travel and other hardships, he attained outstanding success. While still on the road he became interested in the banking business and also operated several retail men's wear stores in

the West. In 1896 he established in Chicago the great business that bears his name and which has long been known as one of the leading firms in its field.

As vice-president and chairman of the labor board of the National Wholesale Tailors Association, Mr. Price was prominently identified with the labor troubles of 1905 and '06.

He was a Mason, a member of the Chicago Athletic Association, Union League Club and Exmoor Country Club.

While he maintained an estate on Sheridan Road in Highland Park, recently Mr. and Mrs. Price, who survives, have made their home at the Edgewater Beach Hotel.

A brother, A. C. Price of Raton, N. M., and a sister, Mrs. Mary Smith of Baldwin, Kan., will attend the services in Chicago which are to be held Thursday at 11 o'clock in the Michigan room at the Edgewater Beach Hotel. Rev. Frank Fitt of Detroit, Mich., former pastor of the Highland Park Presbyterian Church, will officiate. On Saturday morning brief services will be held at the cemetery in Savannah, Mo., where interment will be in the family burial plot.

The Moraine Grocery, on North Green Bay Road, Highland Park, is observing its first birthday anniversary this week.

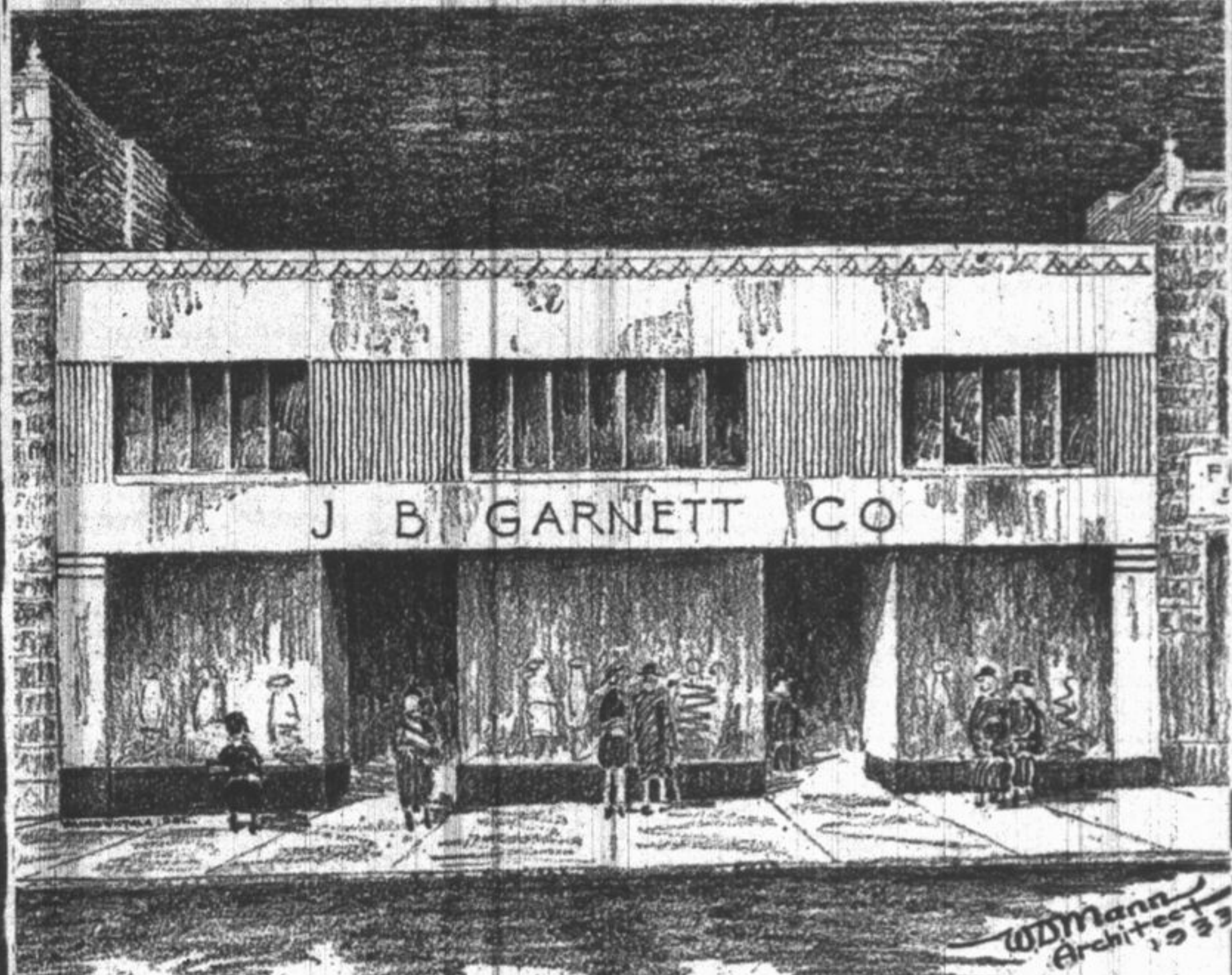
