

**Child Attacked by a Cat at School Ground**

Sara Shafer, 3 years old, of 904 Roslyn Circle, Highland Park, was severely scratched and bit by a large cat last Friday. The animal attacked the child while she was on the grounds of the nursery school she attends. The cat scratched her on the face, neck, chest and hands, and bit her on the cheek, requiring several stitches to close the wounds.

Highland Park police captured the cat near the home of its owner in the 200 block on Central Avenue, and took it to the police station, where it made another break for liberty. The animal scratched and bit Dan Hayes before he and several policemen subdued it. The cat was taken to the dog pound for observation.

**Highland Park Will Have Liquor Control Ordinance This Week**

Highland Park's new liquor control ordinance is undergoing passage this week, in order to give this city control regulations by May 10. The state liquor law specified that after that date any Illinois communities without liquor control regulations of some sort will automatically become "wet."

Under the terms of Highland Park's new ordinance, the following types of licenses and fees are provided for the rigid restriction of the sale of liquor here:

CLASS A—\$750 a year license, to allow sale of alcoholic beverages at retail in bona fide clubs to club members and their guests.

CLASS B—\$750 a year license, to allow sale of alcoholic liquors in packages only, presumably at liquor stores, drug stores, groceries, etc.

CLASS C—\$750 a year license, to allow sale in hotels, cafes or restaurants at retail of alcoholic liquors, but as part of regularly served meals only.

CLASS D—\$7,500 a year license, to allow sale of alcoholic liquors at

retail "in any other manner not prescribed in this ordinance." Thus, after 65 years of being "bone-dry," this city will, in theory, become liberal in the matter of liquor, with extreme reservations that are expected to have little effect on the community's present aridity.

Highwood will be called upon to honor the World War dead and to give aid to the war's living victims by wearing Memorial Poppies on May 26.

This day, the Saturday before Memorial Day, will be poppy day throughout the United States and will be generally observed by the wearing of the little red flower of Flanders field.
