Book Reviews

Two Robust Heroes
"Magnus Merriman," by Eric Linklater
"Long Remember," by McKimley Kantor

Anthony Adverse apparently established a literary vogue for the stalwart, adventurous hero. However, neither Mr. Kantor, author of "Long Remember," or Mr. Linklater, author of "Magnus Merriman," can be accused of following a vogue. That they should come along with novels which, in virility of prose, match Hervey Allen phrase for phrase is merely a coincidence. Or it may be an indication that imaginative literary minds are of a single thought, that where as "rugged individualism" may have disappeared, for the time being at least, from the social fabric, it is more than ever acknowledged to be the stuff from which successful novels are woven.

The reason why we consider these two novels together is because they throw into spotlight prominence the lives of two physically and emotionally dynamic men—lives both branded by the hot fire of war. The Civil War engulfed Dan Bale, but the World War made opportunity for Magnus Merriman.

"Long Remember" is an historically accurate view of the Battle of Gettysburg. Its principal characters are fictional. Dan Bale, the last of his line, returns to Gettysburg after nine years in the Northwest to bury his grandfather and is immediately thrown into the midst of war rumors and the actualities of war. His killing has consisted in bagging animals for food and an occasional self-protective shot at a Sioux. The Civil War has been going on for two years. His childhood playmates are in it—some of them wounded. His neighbor, Tyler Fanning, is an infantry captain. Bale is honest and honorable about his objections to this business of killing without the best of motives. Though not a "copperhead" he detests what the northern armies are doing and the general business of wholesale slaughter and he says so. Captain Fanning is home for a few days on furlough, a bothersome wound received at Antietam allowing him to take precious time from his regiment.

Concentration of rebel forces for a drive into Pennsylvania hurries Captain Fanning back to his regiment, but Bale has met, and loved, Mrs. Fanning. Tyler Fanning's impotence has heightened Mrs. Fanning's healthful zeal for investigation, and the inevitable happens. She and Bale meet clandestinely. Their meetings are the exalted conquests of love over Victorian moral tenets. Nothing sordid, nothing base, but, for them, the world as it should be. However, they are suspected and the suspicion is conveyed by a town oaf to the captain himself. The captain writes to his wife and hints infidelity.

What to do? Bale must find Fanning, says Mrs. Fanning, and lie to him, tell him that his suspicions are unfounded. Bale would prefer to wait, and when the war is over, tell Fanning the truth. But Fanning might die.

Bale delivers his message to Fanning, who has been again badly wounded. Bale himself ministers to the wounded as an assistant of the village doctor. Days they work without food or rest. Fanning is brought home more dead than alive to face a leg amputation. The enormity of her disloyalty to a husband thus wounded while fighting to protect her engulfed Mrs. Fanning. She knows that she must always stay by him, her natural emotional instincts buried deep under the scars of war. And Dan Bale packs a few belongings, locks his house, leaves a will with the village attorney and starts for a more active participation in a war which, at least, holds some hope of forgetfulness.

Besides being an excellent novel, Mr. Kantor has invested the Battle of Gettysburg with all the action and horror which one has come to associate only with a more recent conflict. And justly should it be so, when one considers that battle deaths in the Civil War outnumbered those which Americans suffered in the World War around ten to one. Cannon, mortar and musket did just as good a job of maiming and mangling as any of the devices used fifteen years ago.

Magnus Merriman went to war because the experience appealed to him. The thought of his being badly wounded or killed was only a philosophical reflection. He had no objection to hurling grenades or wielding a bayoneted rifle. He sought decorations but never got them because his bravery was always negated by some trick of fate which angered his superiors.

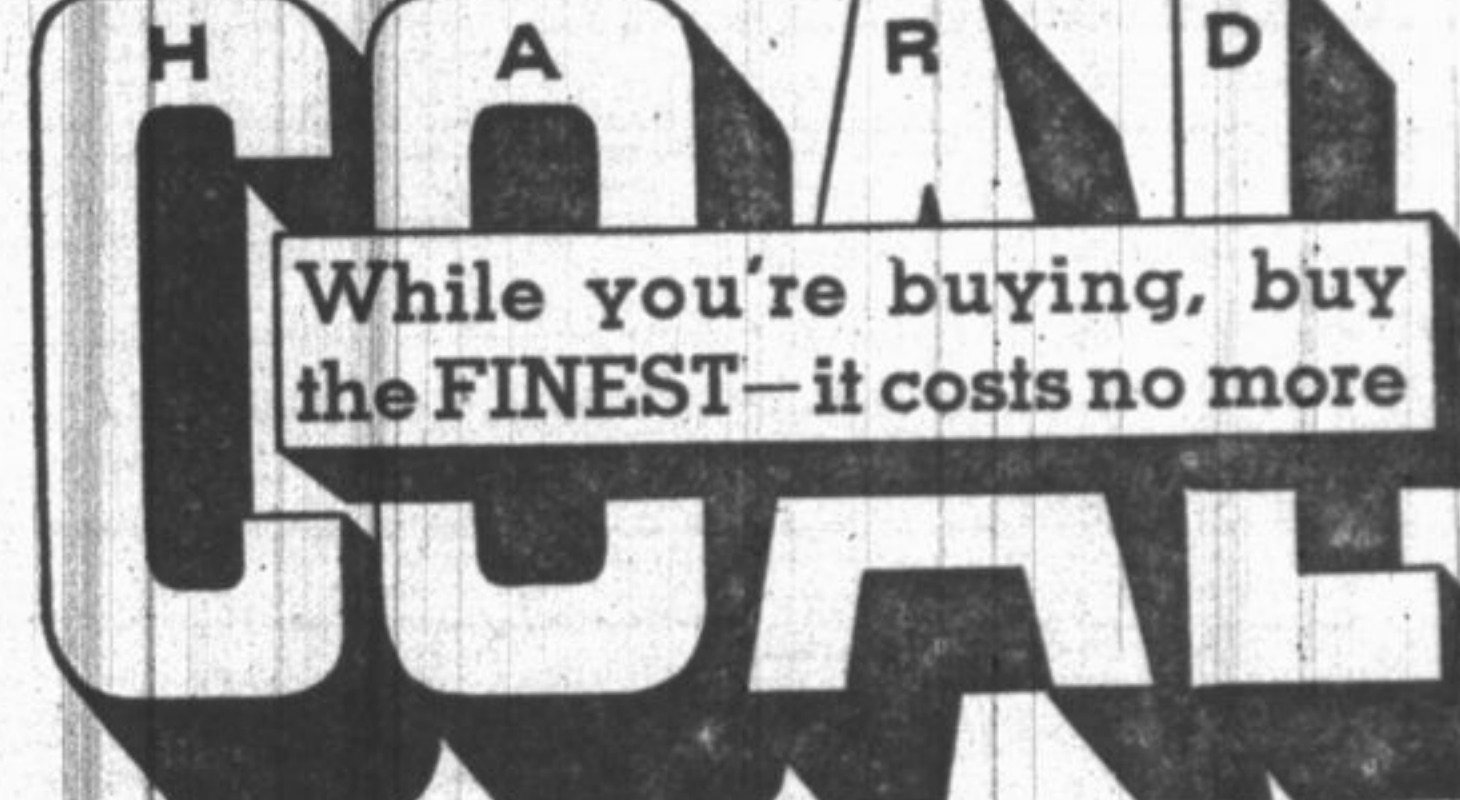
But it is not of the World War Magnus thinks. Magnus, a rugged Scot with a poetic soul and a tough mind, finally mustered out, returned to the university. He took his degree in those subjects which would allow him the most freedom for mental speculation, fell in love with a co-ed taking a medical course, but whose wall of virtue he could never vault, and finally cast himself adrift in the world to do what he

would when he would. This was Magnus's burning wish, though his natural good humor often involved him in situations both physical and emotional to a point far beyond what his credo had set up for him.

After the usual continental dilettantism, Magnus found himself in the possession of quite an enviable reputation and, what was more, a snug competence through the authorship of a novel. He had been writing short pieces on sociology, politics and poetry for whomsoever would pay him a few shillings, but the novel brought many requests from British literary journals.

London and his co-ed sweetheart then claimed him. The sweetheart had married for money, had borne two children and, still young, had been bereft of a husband who left her so little that she was forced to return to the practice of medicine. Once over the wall of her 'virtue' the wall had crumpled here and there to be sure—he found the matron-doctor's emotional yard full of rank weeds where he had hoped to find exotic flowers. So he headed for Edinburgh to visit the editor of a local nationalist journal with whom Magnus had trod adventurously the post-war soil of southern Europe.

Edinburgh meant another love affair, incarceration in jail for a brawling fight with his editor-host over the respective poetic merits of Shakespeare and Racine, campaigning for a seat in Parliament via a bye-election and the infant nationalist ticket, and yet another spell of nausea over his inability to find lasting complacency in anything. His literary bombshells had failed to rend the earth, his romantic adventures had ended by his mistress objecting to his drinking, darning his socks and talking of marriage; and his faith in things political was somewhat shaken when his campaign manager absconded with funds which Magnus himself had posted as a guarantee of his good intentions to stay as a candidate until the elections were over.
