**Faster Service Now
on North Shore Line**

Faster commuter service between Highland Park and the Chicago Loop was inaugurated by the North Shore Line starting on Monday, April 30, with the return to daylight saving time when two new, special express trains were placed in regular operation on the Shore Line Route. These new trains materially reduce commuting time, and furnish additional morning and evening service for the convenience of business men and others traveling to and from Chicago.

The new North Shore Line specials make but one stop between Highland Park and the Chicago Avenue station in Chicago, at Glencoe.

For the morning commuter to Chicago, the special leaves Highland Park station at 8:04 a.m., every day except Sunday, and arrives in the Loop at 8:51 a.m. Returning in the evening, the special leaves the Adams and Wabash downtown Chicago station at 5:08 p.m., every day except Saturday and Sunday, arriving at Highland Park at 5:56 p.m.

Schedules of all trains on the North Shore Line will be adjusted to conform with the change to daylight saving time, which went into effect at 4 a.m., last Sunday, in all north shore communities north to Zion.
