

The Rev. Frank Fitt in Tribute to the Late Ed V. Price

The Rev. Frank Fitt, former pastor of Highland Park Presbyterian Church, delivered the funeral sermon for the late Edward V. Price Thursday of last week.

Edward Valentine Price was born in Savannah, Mo., on Nov. 9, 1856, and received his early education at the West proved irresistible and at a time when many youngsters are going to college he was gaining experience in California, Nevada and Oregon as a cowboy on a cattle-ranch, a worker in the silver mines, a stage-driver on the Western Overland road and a Wells-Fargo messenger and route agent.

A little more than three weeks ago Mr. Price made a trip to Savannah, Mo., just to look once more at the familiar scenes of his boyhood. It was written up in the local paper, what Mr. Price did in that little town, the people to whom he spoke, his interest in the library, which he had given and endowed, his comments on current affairs.

"This is just the barest outline of the career of one whom we all knew as one of the most vivid and colorful personalities of our acquaintance. It was just 16 years ago that I first met Mr. Price and instantly I knew that he was big not merely in stature, but in nature and accomplishment.

"Many recollections of him will come to us, for he was one who could not fail to make himself felt.

I can see him now in my mind as I saw him many times through the years—at Exmoor after a golf game discussing national affairs, (for he was a true patriot and loved his country and was zealous for her welfare)—showing his beloved pictures in his home, taking delight in going over the finer points of his appreciation—his many stories, and he had a genius for this, something akin to Lincoln's, and almost always his story was really a deep and significant comment on life.

Important Meeting of Scientists Held on the North Shore

A notable gathering of water purification experts and plant operators was held in Lake Forest on Tuesday, May 8, when a joint meeting of the Hitchens Science Club and the West Shore Water Producers Association dined at the Deerpath Inn, and spent the evening in a discussion of the technical problems involved in the sanitary analysis of drinking water.

This special meeting was called to give an opportunity for a committee of the American Public Health Association, which is at present engaged in an intensive study of water analysis problems, to explain in detail the work it is doing, and to outline the results that are expected to accrue therefrom.

John R. Baylis, physical chemist, Bureau of Engineering, of Chicago, opened the meeting, as chairman of the West Shore Water Producers Association. As the gathering, besides its technical purpose, was also intended as a farewell tribute to Maj. A. P. Hitchens, Medical Corps, U. S. A., who is being transferred from Fort Sheridan to Washington, D.C., Mr. Baylis gracefully yielded the gavel to the major, who thereafter presided in the dual capacity of head of the Hitchens Science Club and as chairman of the Co-ordinating Committee on Standard Methods of Water Analysis of the American Public Health Association.

Exam for University Scholarship June 2

Lake County candidates for the University of Illinois four-year scholarship will write the competitive examination on Saturday, June 2, County Superintendent of Schools W. C. Petty announces. The winner of the examination, providing a passing grade is made, will be awarded the scholarship at the University.

The examination is open to all pupils graduating this year from high schools in this county, and to graduates of earlier years who have not continued their education beyond the secondary schools. The scholarship exempts the holder from payment of all fees for instruction except laboratory fees, but the scholarship will be given only provided the pupil ranking highest in the examination meets the entrance requirements of the University and actually enters the university next fall. The total value of the scholarship for the four-year period therefore is about \$290.

This year the tests will be given in two parts. All candidates must write an English composition and literature examination. This is an objective type of examination covering the usual high school course in English. This part of the test begins at 9 a. m., June 2, in the office of the County Superintendent of Schools, in Waukegan, and three hours will be allowed to finish it. It will count as 60 per cent in the total examination result. In the afternoon from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m., the candidates may choose any one of the following four fields on which to write: mathematics, foreign language, science, or social studies.
