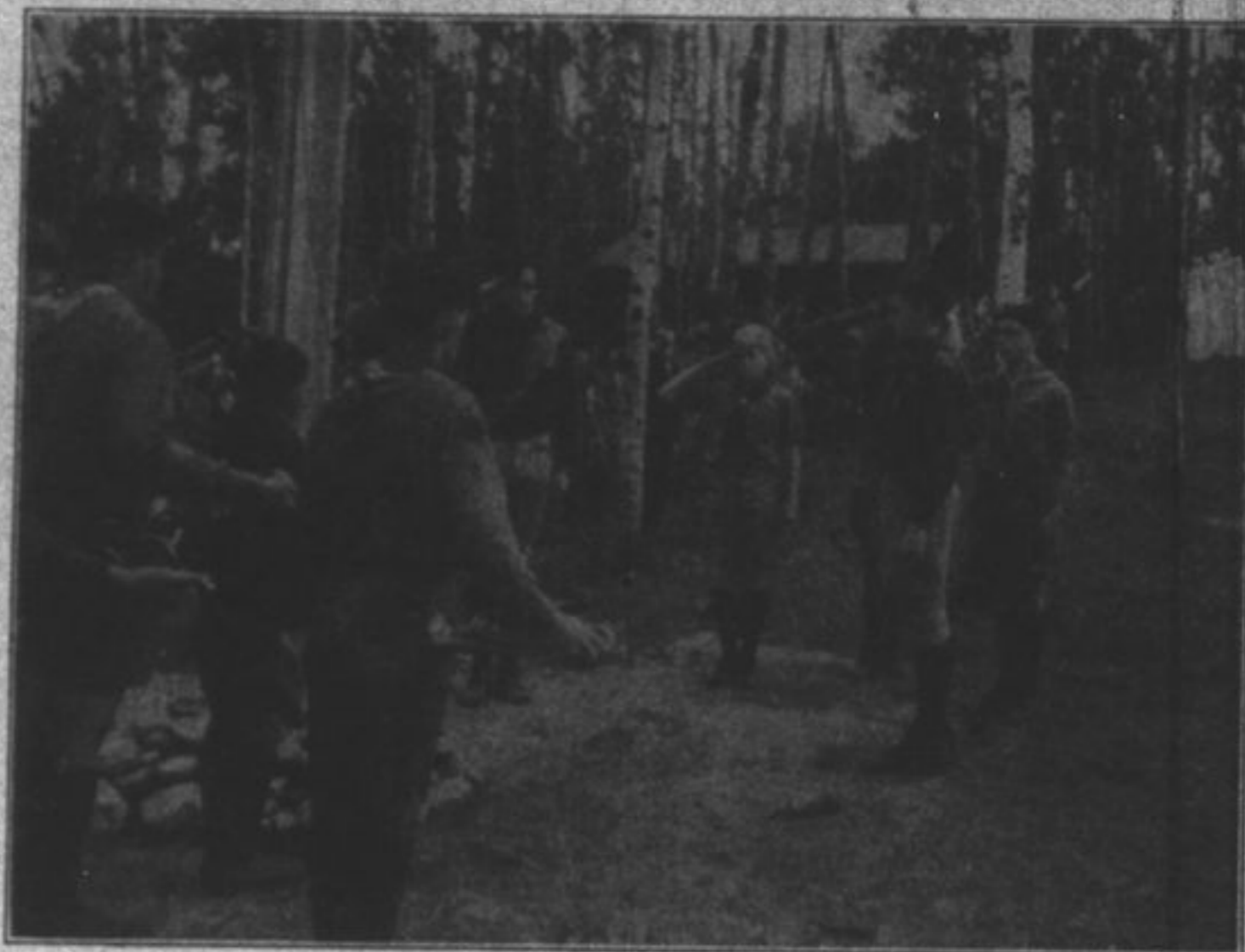

Deerfield Woman's Club Closes Season

"Illinois is one of the most backward states in school legislation with a pageant of 100 years' progress within its boundaries," said Mrs. Laura Hughes Lunde, state chairman of the League of Women Voters, at the Deerfield Woman's Club last Tuesday afternoon. She explained that schools similar to those conducted 100 years ago still existed in Illinois and that it also had some of the most ultra-modern (on the North Shore), but the antiquated schools completely outnumbered the better ones, due to a dilapidated school system.

The United States was the first to establish free schools for all, for they found that the welfare of the nation depended upon the education of its people. The school laws of Illinois have failed to keep pace with the development of the community. Illinois, third wealthiest state in the Union, is among the lowest in school legislation. \$20,000 a day could be saved by new legislation, and refinancing, but politicians hinder advancement.

Mrs. Lunde said it cost four times as much to keep children in correction and reform schools as it did in the public schools. She praised the districts who had visiting teachers and explained that through the home contacts conditions were quickly remedied, thereby saving each community much money. School districts who had visiting teachers, vocational and manual training kept their children in the public schools rather than in reform schools. Since the three highest government costs are, respectively, wars (past and future), roads and education, it behooves each state to have the best possible legislation for its third greatest expense.

Mrs. Lunde's talk revealed the real need for revision of the Illinois educational system.

Mrs. Robert L. Johnson, president of the Deerfield Woman's Club, at the last business meeting for this year, announced the appointment of Mrs. Alex Willman as chairman of the hospitality committee.

Hear Travel Talk on Hudson Bay Country

Sunday evening people of Deerfield and vicinity will have the rare privilege of hearing Dr. Leslie Fuller of Northwestern University lecture at the St. Paul's Evangelical Church. In connection with the lecture Dr. Fuller will show movies of a most interesting and thrilling canoe trip taken last summer in company of his son John and two friends through the interior of Manitoba and Ontario.

The canoe trip led up Berens River to Little Grand Rapids, thence across Ontario to the head waters of the Severn River, at an altitude of 1063 feet above sea level. Down the Severn River to Deer Lake, Favorable Lake, and Sandy Lake. Then across the big portage (five miles) to Island Lake, God's Lake and down God's River to York Factory (Hudson Bay Company post) on Hudson Bay (57 degrees north latitude).

1000 miles were covered in the canoe and 1000 portages were made. Some very interesting contacts were made with the people in the interior. In all five Indian reservations were visited, many of the Indians still adhering to primitive practices. One place was visited where no tourist had been in eight years.
