AN ORDINANCE

BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE HIGHLAND PARK MOSQUITO ABATEMENT DISTRICT APPROPRIATING MONEY FOR ITS CORPORATE PURPOSES TO BE EXPENDED DURING THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING MAY 14, 1935.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE HIGHLAND PARK MOSQUITO ABATEMENT DISTRICT: SECTION 1. That the following amounts, or so much thereof as may be authorized by law and as may be needed, be and the same are hereby appropriated for the corporate purposes of the Highland Mosquito Abatement District as hereinafter specified for the fiscal year ending May 14, 1935:

For payment of interest on warrants maturing taxes levied for the year 1933	\$ 200.00
For field supplies and expenses	1,500.00
For purchase of field equipment	150.00
For office supplies and expense	50.00
For field salaries and wages	6,500.00
For publication expenses	50.00
For Workmen's Compensation and public liability insurance	350.00
For maintenance and upkeep of equipment	200.00
For legal expense	175.00
For inspection expenses	100.00
For contingencies	500.00
For office salaries	100.00
	\$9,575.00

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and due publication.
