

Naval Reserve Unit Undergoes Inspection

An inspection of the Highland Park unit of the U. S. Naval Communications Reserve was given on Wednesday evening at the Community Service, Inc., by Lt. A. L. Becker, U.S.N., who is district communication officer of the Ninth Naval District and aide to the commandant at Great Lakes Naval Training Station.

"Highland Park is fortunate in having this unit available," said Lt. Becker, "in the event of any local or sectional disaster or emergency. I find that it is well equipped and ready for mobilization with little warning."

The purpose of the federal inspector was to determine the efficiency of this unit in regard to emergency communication channels in co-operation with the American Red Cross, and to inventory all materials issued the Naval Reserve by the Navy Department.

Rhea S. Johnson, commanding officer, was strong in his praise of the men under his command. In his address he said, "Without the wholehearted aid of the officers assisting me, and the loyalty of the enlisted personnel, this unit would not have been possible. The hard work of organizing is over, and I wish to compliment all of you. With your continued support we can still further improve our communication facilities, to the point where we will be the outstanding unit in this section."

Several men wishing to enlist were present, among them Raymond Sneed, of the Highland Park Fire Department, and Ray Seiffert, a postal employee. Others traveled from the western suburbs of Chicago and from McHenry County. Jim Bond, former Marine, an attendant at the Highland Park Service Station, was present at the invitation of the unit commander. Mr. Bond has volunteered his services as instructor in arms and infantry drill.

Officers assisting Mr. Johnson in command of the unit are R. P. Blake, executive officer; Lloyd Tucker, communication officer; and Robert Willis, material officer.
