SHIPMAN TO BE SKIPPER OF THE "ALBATROSS"
In the absence of Jack Demorett who has been the skipper of the Sea Scout Ship "Albatross" for the past three summers the Sea Scout Division of the North Shore Area Council is very pleased to announce that the skipper this summer will be Jerry Shipman, well known to Sea Scouts everywhere as the director of the Sea Scouts of the Chicago Council for the past seven years. 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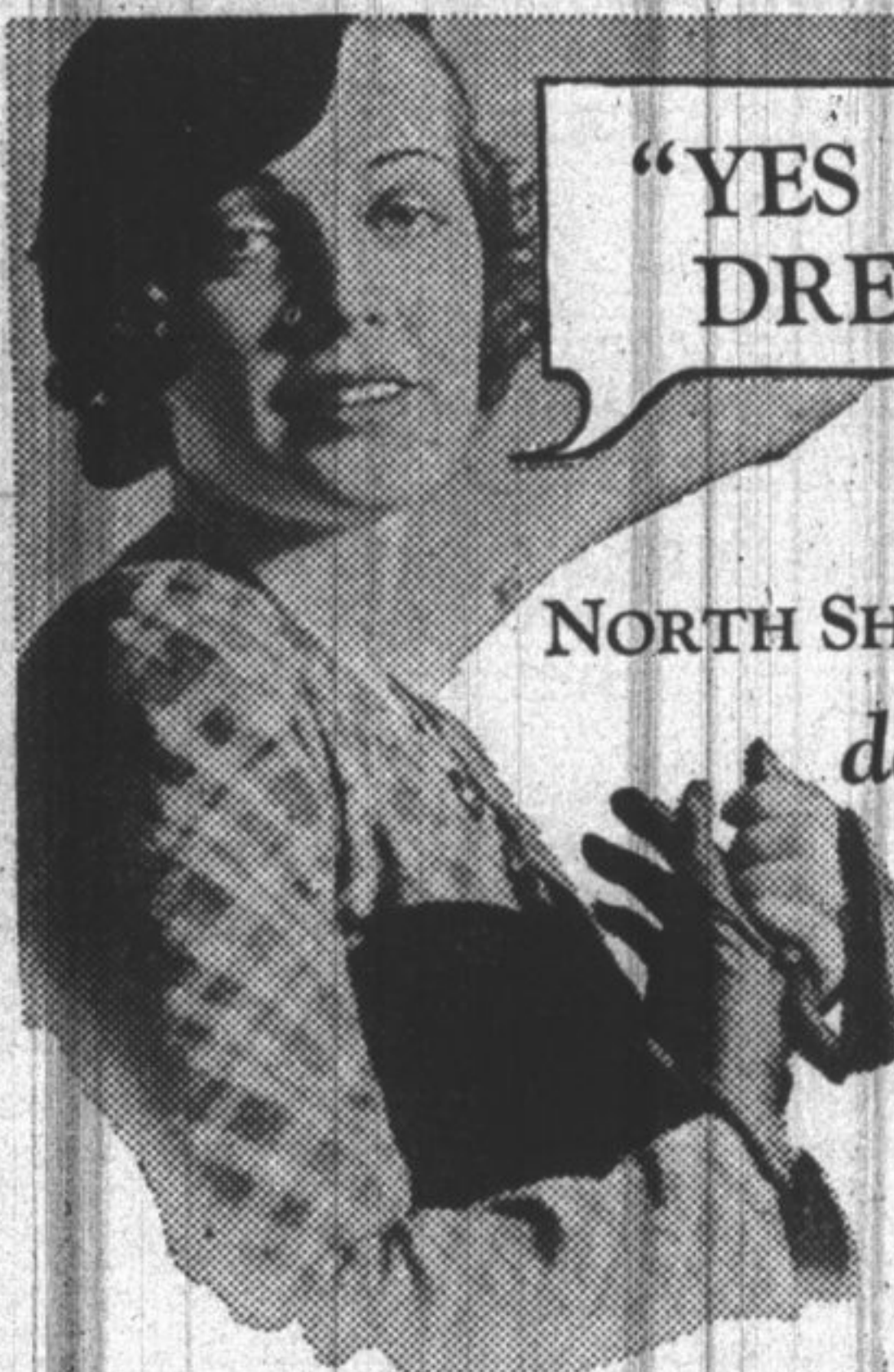
Cutler's Beauty Shop Gives Consultations
