inequitably against those states which have the most humanitarian laws against child labor. When a state like Tennessee can invite manufacturers to locate there by boasting: "No child labor laws, no minimum-wage laws, no laws protecting the worker in any way," we must see the urgent necessity for a uniform regulation of such conditions. Employers of child labor can always undersell the others, and this causes either a lowering of standards or the loss of business from those states in which the rights of children are more strictly guarded.

"We need federal initiative not only to get real action, but to make for unity. The piecemeal process leaves us, even when speeded up with a hodgepodge of state laws, penalizing employers in states that want to do the right thing, and uneven in the protection it throws over the children.

"Child labor is not abolished so long as machines are still being built especially for children to work at.

"In addition to this, we must again emphasize the fact that federal regulation, any more than state regulation, would not control children in any way except in industry."

Mrs. Lunde, who conducted the round table discussion on Education, explained just what had been accomplished at the national convention held in Boston April 23-28, with regard to the subject. She emphasized the unique character of the league as a political organization, in that it has never yet advocated a stand on any question which has not undergone a period of intensive study. "The League," said Mrs. Lunde, "is a middle of the road group of laymen, made up of both 'lefts' and 'rights,' who together devise a carefully planned and restricted program, the objective of which is to serve the public good."

"We believe in education supported by public funds, which is compulsory for children and available for adults. In conjunction with this, we desire to stress the responsibility of the voters for high standards of education.

"The educational work done in the Civil Conservation Corps under the guidance of the federal government was brought to the attention of the delegates at the convention. The classes, initiated and conducted by members of the corps itself, plus those taught by certain of the officers in charge, include a wide variety of subjects, and are mainly of the vocational type. Since most of the young men enlisted in the organization were entirely without training of this sort, the work is filling a definite need. This experiment may even prove the basis of a permanent order."

A Liquor Store In Highwood Is Robbed

Thieves broke into the Liebschutz wholesale liquor store in Highwood early last Friday morning and secured a quantity of liquor valued at about \$500.

The cheaper brands of whiskies were not taken, as the robbers made away with the higher-priced, aged brands.

Chief of Police S. P. Loesch said that the thieves had apparently worked with great speed, and that they broke open both front and rear doors. An employe of the store lives above the shop, and he was awakened between 2 and 3 o'clock by the robbers. He gave the alarm, and the police arrived just a few minutes after the robbers had fled.

Highwood To Begin Wheel Tax Drive

Police of Highwood will scour that city starting Monday, May 28, in a drive against wheel tax delinquents. The city auto licenses became due on May 1.
