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HIGHWOOD HAS NEW CHIEF OF POLICE

Frank Fink Replaces S. P. Loesch As Fourth Chief In Three Years

Frank Fink is Highwood's new chief of police, the fourth in three years, following the dismissal of S. P. Loesch by the mayor and city council last week.

Chief of Police Fink has served as patrolman on the Highwood police force since May, 1933, when Mr. Loesch was made chief. The new chief will have to patrol a beat just like the other three men on the force, owing to an economy program adopted by the city of Highwood recently.

The dismissal of Mr. Loesch came after a week of charges and counter-charges, and denials and counter-denials, that a change would be made in the Highwood force. Mr. Loesch stated about two weeks ago that he was to be dismissed, but this statement was denied by Mayor, E. V. Mocogni and members of the city council.

Their action in replacing Mr. Loesch with Chief Fink came after a secret meeting held Thursday night of last week.

Penalty for Unpaid Taxes Starts June 1

A penalty of 1 per cent per month for delinquent payment of taxes will be imposed in Lake County starting June 1.

May 1 was the legal date for imposing this penalty, but complications caused by difficulty in providing surety bonds resulted in delay in mailing tax bills this year. Consequently the first tax collections were not made until after May 1. For this rate, the penalty date was postponed to June 1.

Thus far tax collections in the county have totaled about \$1,250,000. Many of the larger taxpayers are expected to pay their taxes before the June 1 deadline. The 1 per cent per month penalty is imposed until the time for tax sales next fall.

Freezing Temperature in County Last Week

Damage amounting to several thousand dollars was suffered by Lake County farmers on Thursday night and early Friday morning last week by freezing weather which descended upon the county killing tomato and potato plants in truck gardens.

The mercury dipped as low as 31 degrees above zero, which is unusually cold for this time of year, according to Joseph Badger, United States weather observer in Waukegan. It was one of the coldest May nights in years.

Over 500 Enter the Grade School Track Meet Last Saturday

A track and field meet for grade schools in this district was held last Saturday morning at the Deerfield-Shields High School athletic field. The meet, which was sponsored by Community Service, Inc., and Deerfield-Shields High School, had teams entered in it from five grade schools, Elm Place, Lincoln, and Ravinia, all of Highland Park, and the schools from Lake Forest and Highwood.

Over five hundred athletes, boys and girls, were entered in the meet by the various schools and some remarkable records were made both in the field and the track events. The outstanding achievements were made on the track by Eugene Schondorf of Elm Place in the 100-yard dash and the 220-yard dash with the times of 11.3 and 26.4 which is very fast even in high school competition; 8th grade 440-yard relay team also from Elm Place and composed of Schondorf, Kelly, Moseley, and Durment, turned in the very fast time of 54.4 in that race. In the field events Baker of Ravinia 7th grade was the outstanding performer throwing the discus 87 feet and putting the shot 33 feet 2 inches to take first place in his class. Simpson of Ravinia was the all-class winner in the discus, throwing it 87 feet 4 inches, and Suttle of Lincoln was all class winner in the shot, putting it 36 feet 8 inches. The girls also came through with their share of marks, the best being that made by Joan Nash of the Elm Place 6th grade by broad-jumping 13 feet 5 inches.

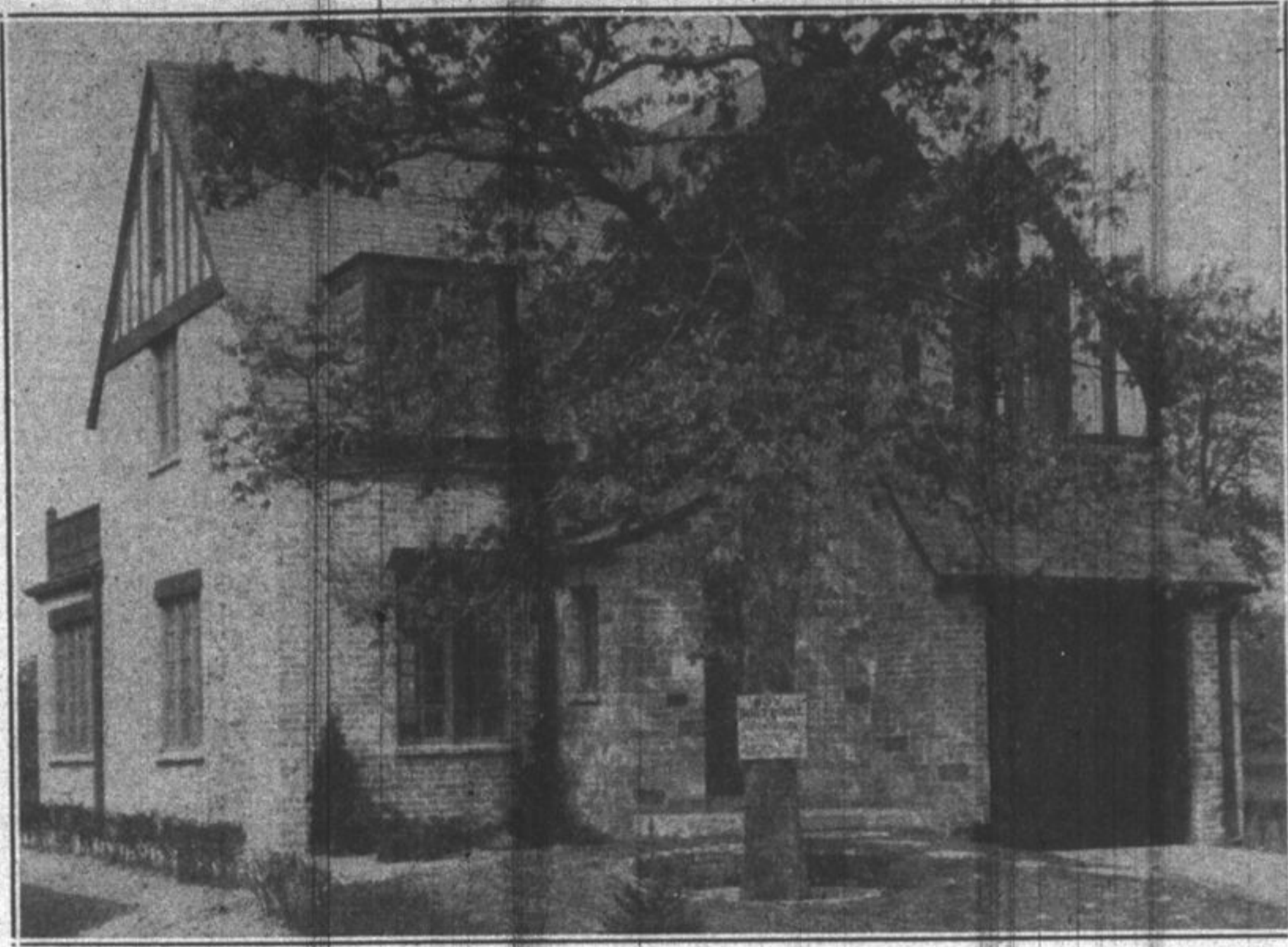

House Built By High School Boys



STUDENTS BUILD A 7-ROOM HOUSE

English Style Structure in Ravinia on Display June 1, 2, 3

The house, which has been constructed by the building trades classes of Deerfield-Shields Township High School, will be open to inspection June 1, 2, and 3, and the public is cordially invited to visit this exhibit of the boys' work. It is located at 1748 Broadway Avenue, Ravinia, one and one-half blocks south of Roger Williams Avenue and one block east of Green Bay Road.

This seven room house of old English style is a story and a half in height, with a brick exterior and a stone entry. The landscaping was planned by one of the students, and the boys helped set out the shrubs and trees. Because of the unemployment situation, some of the work was done by local laborers. A journeyman from each of the skilled trades was employed to work with the boys.

In the first floor, there are a living room, sun parlor, dining room, kitchen, and lavatory. Off the kitchen there is a rear hallway which leads to the garage attached to the north side of the house. One of the outstanding features of the garage is the overhead sliding doors. On the second floor, there are two bedrooms, a tiled bathroom, and an open deck which is over the sun parlor and dining room. In the basement, there are a recreation room, fruit cellar, and furnace room and laundry combined. The heating plant consists of a warm air furnace with an oil burner and an air conditioning unit which filters the air, gives it the proper humidity, and sends it by fan into the room pure and warm.

The boys in these vocational building trades classes spend half of their school day on the job building a house under the direction of Walter E. Durbahn. The other half of the day is spent in the classroom, two periods with Miss Regina Beckmire in English and social science, and two periods with D. J. Davitt in related mathematics and related mechanical and architectural drawing. This building trades work is a part of the vocational and industrial work is a part of the vocational and industrial work of the Deerfield-Shields Township High School with R. W. Schneider as director of this department.
