

North Western Road Wins First Place In 1933 Safety Contest

The Chicago & North Western Railway System received first place trophy for winning the annual safety contest among Class A railroads at a dinner just held in Chicago. G. B. Vilas, general manager of the North Western Railway, under whose supervision the safety work has gone on, received the plaque.

This is the fourth consecutive year the Chicago & North Western Railway has led all Class A railroads in America in the employee safety contest. The records are based on employee casualties (killed and injured.) There were only 5 employees killed and 89 injured on the Chicago & North Western Railway in 1933, a reduction of more than 23 per cent over 1932 when 15 employees were killed and 101 injured.

In complimenting the Chicago & North Western Railway System on receiving the award, John E. Long, president of the National Safety Council, said, "This system, with its major unit, the Chicago & North Western Railway, has led this premier group for three consecutive years with the lowest total casualty

rate of any competing railroad or system. In recording 1.91 for the year 1933, the Chicago & North Western System turned in for the second time a total employee casualty rate well under the "2" goal, a distinction that has not thus far been attained by any other system in this major group."

has been ill about five weeks.

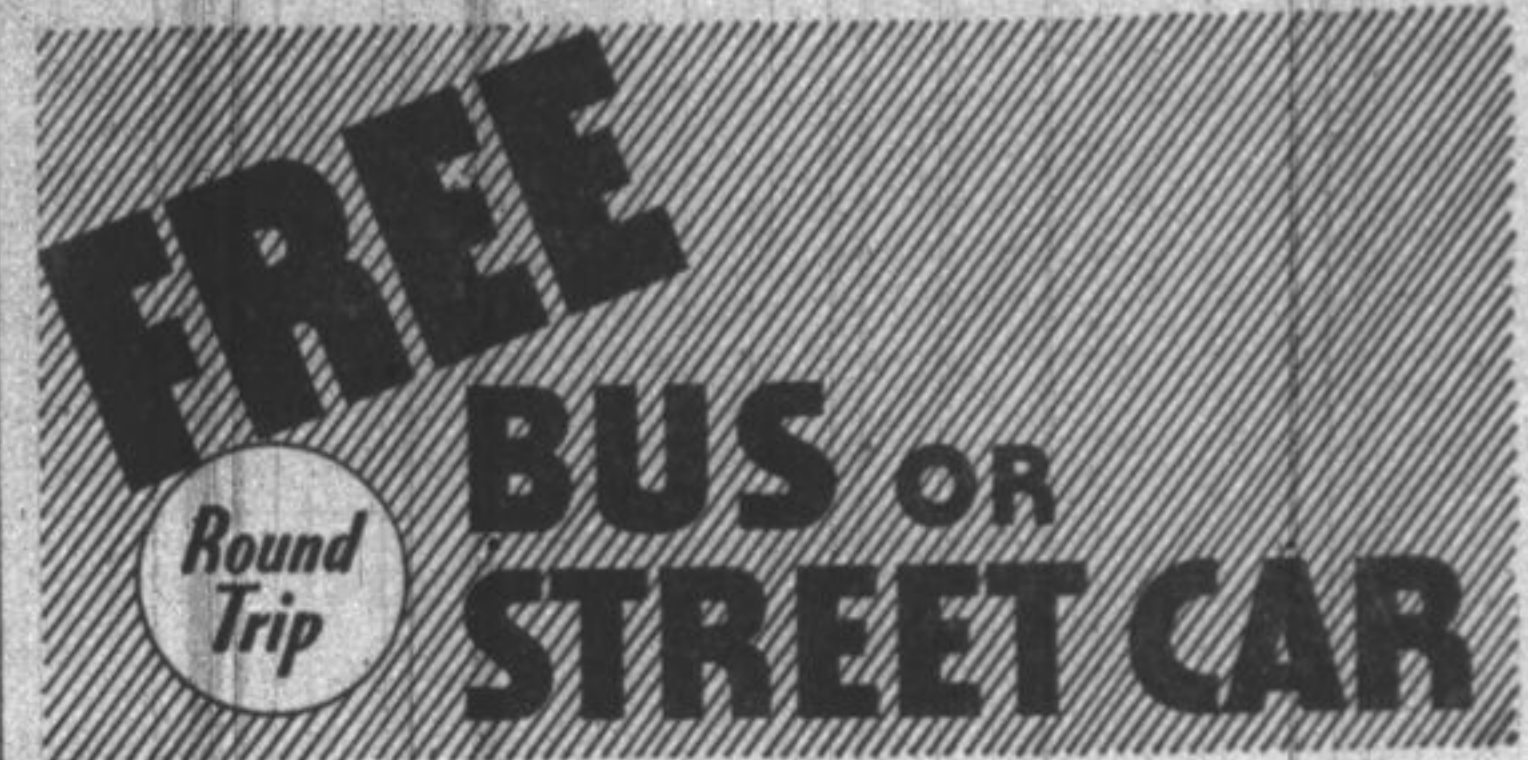
The Wilson family of Evanston moved to Bannockburn recently to the house formerly occupied by the E. R. Seese family.

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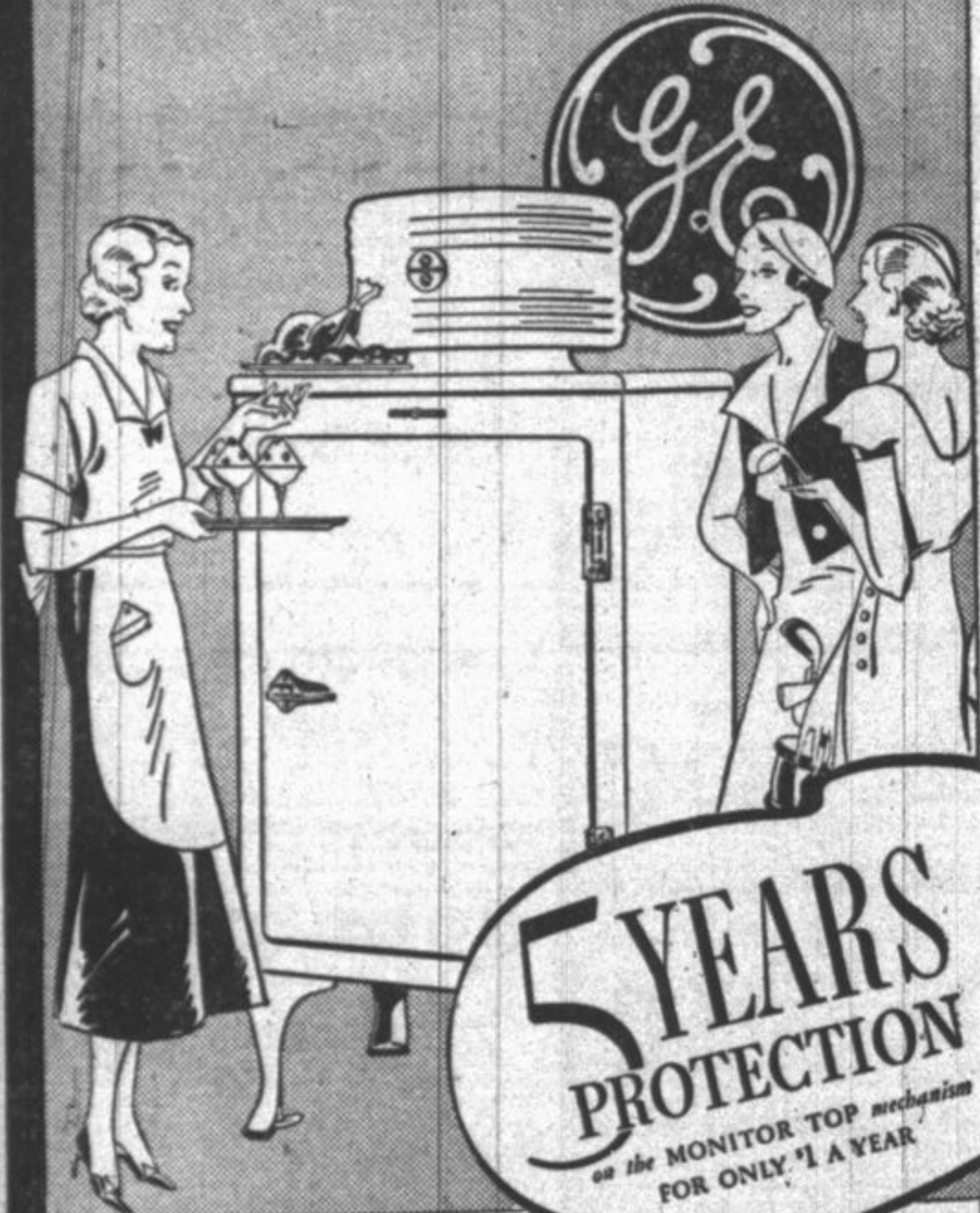
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Mr. George O. Bliss of N. Linden Avenue is leaving Friday for Dayton, Ohio where he will attend a wedding, returning home Sunday.
