High School Board Will Take Coal Bids

Bids on coal and hauling of same will be received for consideration at the June 20 meeting of the Board of Education of the Deerfield-Shields Township High School.

Bids shall cover 1,500 (minimum) to 1,500 (maximum) tons of Franklin County, or equivalent grade, one and one-half inch screenings, with optional price on two inch screenings, pea, and No. 3 coal.

Bids may be F.O.B. mines; F.O.B. team tracks and yard tracks, or delivered to bin of Power House of plant on Vine Avenue and St. Johns Avenue, Highland Park.

Bids shall state location of mine or mines, freight rates from mine to Highland Park, if bid is F.O.B. mine to Highland Park, and a complete analysis of a typical sample.

Delivery: Fill bin, approximately 300 tons, on or before September 1, 1934; balance of contract as needed throughout the school year. Contract to be completed before June 1, 1935.

Hauling: Bids will also be received on hauling coal from team tracks or yard tracks to bins and dumping therein.

Marking of Bids: All bids shall be plainly marked on the outside of envelope; "Coal Bid" or "Coal Hauling Bid," and addressed to the Board of Education, Deerfield - Shields Township High School, Highland Park, Illinois.

The Board of Education reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

WHAT TO TAKE TO CAMP

Many Scouts have been asking what it will be necessary to take with them when they go to camp. The following information will be sent to each Scout registered for camp, but for the convenience of those who desire to have the information now it is given.

First of all it is necessary to have at least three heavy woolen blankets for the night get chilly. Each Scout should have two extra shirts suitable for outdoor use, an extra pair of trousers, a pair of breeches, a heavy sweater or lumberjack, a poncho or raincoat, at least one change of underwear, a pair of good strong shoes for hiking use, at least three pairs of stockings, swimming suit by all means—either suit or trunks, pocket knife, half-dozen brush and palamas. The Scout Handbook handkerchiefs, couple of towels, soap, toothbrush, tooth powder, comb, brush, soap, etc. The following list is a list of those things it would be advisable to have although not so necessary—flashlight, compass, camera, sweater kit, rope, first aid kit, canteen and fishing tackle.
