Non-High District Is Indebted To the Local High School

For a number of years the Non-High School Board of Education of Lake County has been unable to pay the full amount of cost of tuition of pupils from their district in attendance at the regular high schools of the county. The Deerfield-Shields Township High School recently sued the Non-High School Board for the sum of \$36,000. The claim was not allowed by the Appellate Court on the ground that part payment had been accepted without demur. At the present time the district is indebted for more than a year's tuition to all the high schools of the county.

On Feb. 7, 1934, at a meeting of the boards of education of various high school districts in the county the following resolution was passed: "Resolved, that inasmuch as the Non-High School District Board of Education of Lake County is not paying the per capita cost of educating students in the high schools of the county, and is not making any sincere effort to secure an increase in the tax rate which will enable it to pay such cost, this meeting recommends to the high school boards of education of Lake County, that unless sincere and definite action is taken at the coming session of the legislature to secure an increase in the tax rate of the non-high school district which will enable it to pay the full per capita cost of educating the children residing therein, or that some other measures be taken to make up the difference between the amount the non-high school district can raise by taxation, and the actual per capita cost of educating such students, that all students residing in the non-high school district territory in Lake County be denied admission to the high schools of this county.

"Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be mailed to the Non-High School Board of Education of Lake County, to the Illinois School Board Association, to the legislative committee of the Tri-County School Board Association, and to each Board of Education of

a high school district in Lake County." On Tuesday evening of this week another meeting was held and the following motion unanimously was adopted:

"That the members here present recommend to their several Boards that the high schools of the county do not accept Non-High School District students during the coming year unless some plan is offered to them whereby the per capita cost of the students may be paid."

This means that the parents interested and the Board of Education of the Non-High School District of Lake County will have to find some means of meeting the tuition and satisfying the various high school authorities who believe that they have no right under the law to educate children of their several districts for less than the actual per capita cost.

The Non-High School District has a tax rate of 50 cents on \$100 assessed valuation. Obviously this will not meet the cost of educating their children when in all of the high school districts the rate is \$1 or over.
