The Drum and Bugle Corps will have charge of the dancing, and has arranged for an excellent ten-piece orchestra and an amplifying system. Plans are being made to give the floor a special treatment of wax so that it will be in excellent condition. Finance Officer D. C. Stuke, Post Auditor Hiendricks and P. E. Cole have charge of the financial arrangements. Legionnaire McNaughton will be in charge of supplies, and Theodore Arnsward will be in charge of stand construction ably assisted by A. C. Stemm.
