

Highland Park Boys Receive Honors at Academy Graduation

Hamilton Herman, John Holmes and Hugo Sonnenschein, maintained their names on the Academy's second scholastic honor roll throughout the year, while Christoph Keller received honorable mention in the prize award of excellence in French III. John Holmes received book prizes for excellence in ancient history and American history, while Hugo Sonnenschein, Jr. received the English prize consisting of a set of Dickens, which is presented annually by Mrs. Mark Oliver of River Forest, Ill., as a memorial to her husband, a member of the class of 1901, "to the member of the senior class who, in the judgment of the faculty speaks the best English in the school."

Next fall, Hamilton Herman will enter Dartmouth, while Hugo Sonnenschein, Jr., John Holmes and Christoph Keller will enroll, respectively, at Princeton, Kenyon and Sewanee.
