"Is the Universe, including Man, Evolved by Atomic Force?" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, June 24.

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Bless the Lord, O my soul. O Lord my God, thou art very great; thou art clothed with honour and majesty. Who coverest thyself with light as with a garment: who stretchest out the heavens like a curtain; who layeth the beams of his chambers in the waters; who maketh the clouds his chariot: who walketh upon the wings of the wind: who laid the foundations of the earth, that it should not be removed for ever" (Psalms 104:1-3, 5).
The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Material evolution implies that the great First Cause must become material, and afterwards must either return to Mind or go down into dust and nothingness. . . . Inspired thought relinquishes a material, sensual, and mortal theory of the universe, and adopts the spiritual and immortal" (p. 547).

All-Expense Vacations
Featured This Summer
"All-Expense Vacations" in the North Woods of Wisconsin and Upper Michigan will be offered by the Chicago & North Western Railway this summer starting June 16 and lasting through Sept. 1 for travelers from the Chicago district and from Milwaukee, R. Thomson, passenger traffic manager of the road, announces. The plan is designed for those who want to spend either one or two weeks on their vacation trips fishing, swimming, horseback riding, hiking, or just loafing in this nearby playground.
Under this new plan, the vacationer will have a choice of almost 100 resorts in the North Woods section, and will know before he starts the total cost of his railroad fare, round-trip, sleeping car accommodations, the cost of lodging and meals at the resort for either eight or 15 days and the use of a rowboat while on his vacation.
The cost of the all-expense vacations as compared with a "go it alone" trip will be cheaper due to special arrangements between the Chicago & North Western Railway and the resorts.
The tours will leave Chicago on Saturday nights throughout the summer and vacationers will return either on the second or third Monday morning, depending on the length of time they wish to spend on their vacations.
"The North Woods has been the middle west's favorite vacation spot for years. We think an all-expense plan of this kind, allowing one to figure vacation costs before starting, will enhance the popularity of the hundreds of lakes in this region," Mr. Thomson added. "A tryout on week-end all-expense tours for winter sports in the North Woods created much interest in January and February—based on that, these summer trips should be extremely popular."

Clean carbon from cylinder head and top of pistons.
Remove valve cover plate, valve springs, valves and push rods.
Clean carbon from valves and valve stem guides.
Inspect valve faces for pits and valve stems for alignment.
Reface valves, using Sioux Electric Refacing Machine.

Retighten cylinder head nuts.
Adjust valve tappets to standard clearance.
Replace valve cover plate tightly.
Tighten water pump packing nut.
