- (4) Manuscripts are to be mailed to the office of the Temple, Lincoln and Vernon avenues, Glencoe.
- (5) Play must be suitable for Sisterhood production.

Jim's Circus Team of Deerfield, lost both ends of a baseball double header to the Chicago White Eagles, and Libertyville's strong nine, 9-4, and 7-1, respectively last Sunday. In the Eagle half of the fifth, with the Clowns enjoying a 4-0 lead over the Chicago boys, Les Horder, pitcher, permitted the first hit, that by Hixson. Sullivan's error gave life to the next batter. Two errors by Gehris and Sullivan, a walk, and two doubles off Horder cinched the game for Chicago in the seventh with four runs.

Brown, Cafone's miff of Faulker's fly, a fielder's choice on S. Trambie, and hits by Garrison and P. Brown. Loyn's double, and two singles ended the scoring in the eighth with one run.

Libertyville's large crowd stayed until Berndtson's, Clowns' pinch batter, had grounded out in the ninth, with hopes of a Deerfield rally for pitcher Horder, whose courageous work was nullified by poor support.


