How Northwestern University Settlement is being enabled to carry on an extensive and inclusive program of work and play, because of benefits received from the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission, is a matter of publication on the part of its friends, particularly to members of its local board, of which Mrs. Charles A. Wright is the chairman.

The other members of the local board are Mrs. Jay S. Glidden, treasurer; Mrs. Roswell Swasey, secretary; and Mrs. Robert Walker, vice-chairman.

"The addition of 20 trained workers assigned by the Cook County Division of the settlement, in co-operation with the Chicago Council of Social Agencies, is making possible this considerably augmented program there under the Children's Leisure Time Service, which also includes adults," Mrs. Wright reports.

"These summer projects are the salvation of the 2000 people who are finding outlet for troubles in work and play under direction of the settlement, and we look upon this program as one of extreme importance, for as it goes this summer so will go the national recreational program which is certain to come out of this experiment in emergency constructive recreation to meet the demands of extended leisure."
