150 Funmakers with Huge Circus Aug. 2

Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Combined Circus, making its 1934 tour of the continent and definitely scheduled to exhibit in Evanston on Thursday, Aug. 2, has assembled from the four corners of the earth—and points in between—the greatest aggregation of clowns
