FIGURES SHOW INCREASE AT CAMP MA-KA-JA-WAN

Camp MaKaJaWan, the Scout camp for Scouts of the North Shore Area Council, has just completed its sixth season. A total of 841 "Boy Weeks" was spent at camp this summer which was an increase of 30% over last year. The program was rich in fun for all Scouts and many of them are expressing a wish that they were back up at camp at Spring Lake again. Advancement and merit badge work was also in excess of last year, there being a total of 365 merit badges passed in the six weeks and many Scouts progressing from second to first class. A total of eight Scouts achieved the Eagle rank; 19 Star Scouts and 11 achieved the rank of Life Scout.

The American Legion of Illinois has invited all Boy Scouts to attend the World Series Baseball play-off at Sox Park and Cubs Park. The game starts at 3 o'clock but all Scouts and their leaders are to be on hand at 2 o'clock to sit in a special Boy Scout section.
