Retail Business In Lake County Is One Of "Bright Spots"

Retail business and the employment of retail labor was definitely on the upgrade during 1933 in Lake County, according to figures released this week in the retail report of the Census of American Business. Net retail sales for Lake County in 1933 were \$26,582,000.

The survey reveals that there are 1,377 retail stores operating in the county, with 1,268 proprietors. The county's retail shops gave employment to 2,482 full-time clerks while approximately 780 part-time clerks were used.

Lake County retail stores last year distributed payrolls aggregating \$2,749,000 to full-time workers while part-time clerks were paid \$355,000 for the year.

There were but four counties in Illinois with a higher volume of retail trade in 1933 than Lake County. These were Cook, Kane, Peoria, and Sangamon counties.

Michael Rogan Killed In Indiana Accident

Michael Rogan, former Highland Park man employed on the North Shore Line bus system but more recently a policeman at Evanston, was killed and his wife, Helen, seriously injured in an auto accident near Washington, Ind., Friday night. The Rogans were on their way from Plainfield to Washington to procure groceries when the accident occurred. The children had remained at home with relatives with whom they and their mother had been spending the summer.

Mr. Rogan was born in Highland Park Nov. 24, 1901, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Rogan, Sr., 612 Laurel Avenue. He attended the Elm Place and Lincoln schools, graduating from the latter in 1914.

Mr. Rogan, who lived at 122 Clyde Avenue, Evanston, was driving with his wife when he swerved around a curve in the road and collided with a bus. He was killed instantly while Mrs. Rogan was taken to Hines hospital at Washington seriously injured.

Although he was only a member of the Evanston police force for four years, during that time he had won the Patton Award three times. His services in this capacity have received the highest praise from his superior officers.

Funeral services for Mr. Rogan were held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Schaefer funeral home, Evanston, and burial was in Memorial Park Cemetery. Brother officers served as pall bearers and acted as an escort to the cemetery.

Besides his wife he leaves to survive him, three children, Patsy, Doris Jean, and Jerry, his mother and father, two sisters, Mrs. Helen Moran and Mrs. Lillie Dodson, and five brothers, Harry, Walter, George, Edward, John and a host of other relatives and friends.

Lake County Cattle To Die Because of Disease

Lake County farmers will be reimbursed by the federal government for cattle which are to be killed because of Bang's disease. The state of Illinois has accepted the offer of the government to test the cattle on Lake County farms for the dreaded disease which causes the cows to lose their embryo calves before birth and stops the flow of milk.

Estimates place the number of cattle suffering from Bang's disease in Lake County at 4,000. If that many head are slaughtered the farmers will receive between \$80,000 and \$200,000. The payment to the farmer will be \$50 for pure bred cows and \$20 for grade bulls. These are top prices.

Because of the drought many cattle were infected with the disease, which is said to be contagious.

Hubbard Woods Bank Pays Another Dividend

Edward J. Barrett, state auditor, Tuesday announced that he has authorized payment of a 25 per cent dividend amounting to \$44,026.59 to the depositors of the Hubbard Woods Trust and Savings Bank, Winnetka. This is their dividend to be paid since the bank closed, bringing the total up to 55 per cent.

In addition to this dividend \$2,700.38 has been paid to preferred creditors and \$39,500.00 has been paid on bills payable.
