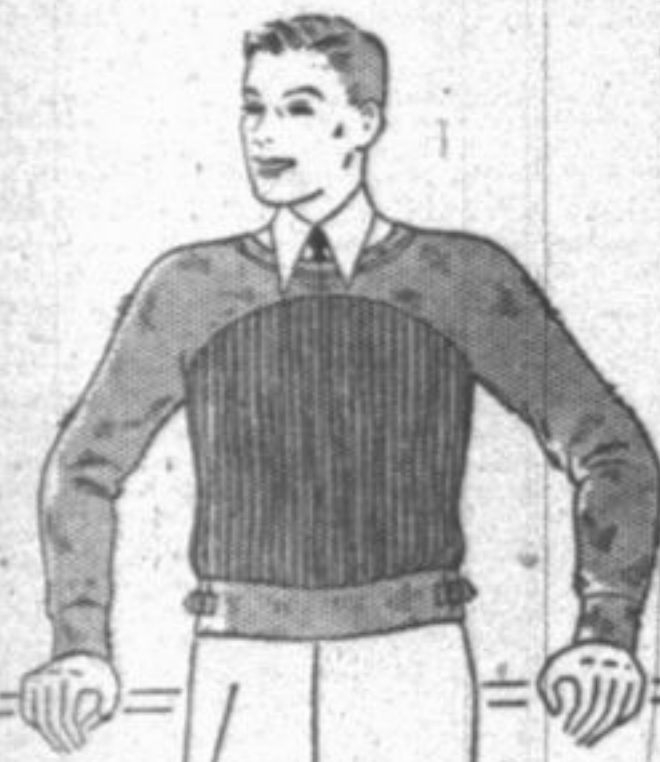

Albert J. Nason Dies In St. Paul Last Week

After several months' illness, Albert John Nason, formerly of Highland Park, died at his home in St. Paul on Wednesday, Aug. 29.

He is survived by his widow Mary Ethel Nason, four children, John, Margaret, Philip and Albert Jr., and by two sisters, Mrs. A. G. Crooker of Fairmont, Minn., and Miss Sabra L. Nason of Lake Grove, Ore.

Funeral services were held at the Olivet Congregational Church, Dewey and Iglehart avenues, on Friday morning, Aug. 31, at 10:30. They were conducted by Dr. Donald J. Cowling, president of Carleton College. Interment was private in Oakland Cemetery.

Mr. Nason was born at East Smithfield, Penn., June 1, 1878, the son of Rev. John H. Nason, a widely known Congregational minister and missionary in Minnesota in the early days. He was a graduate of Carleton College, class of 1901, and subsequently served as a member of its board of trustees for many years. Married in 1902 to Miss Mary Ethel Eaton of Rochester, Minn., Mr. Nason settled in St. Paul and engaged actively in the land and real estate business throughout the northwest. He was chairman of the building committee of the St. Paul Athletic Club at the time of the erection of its present building,

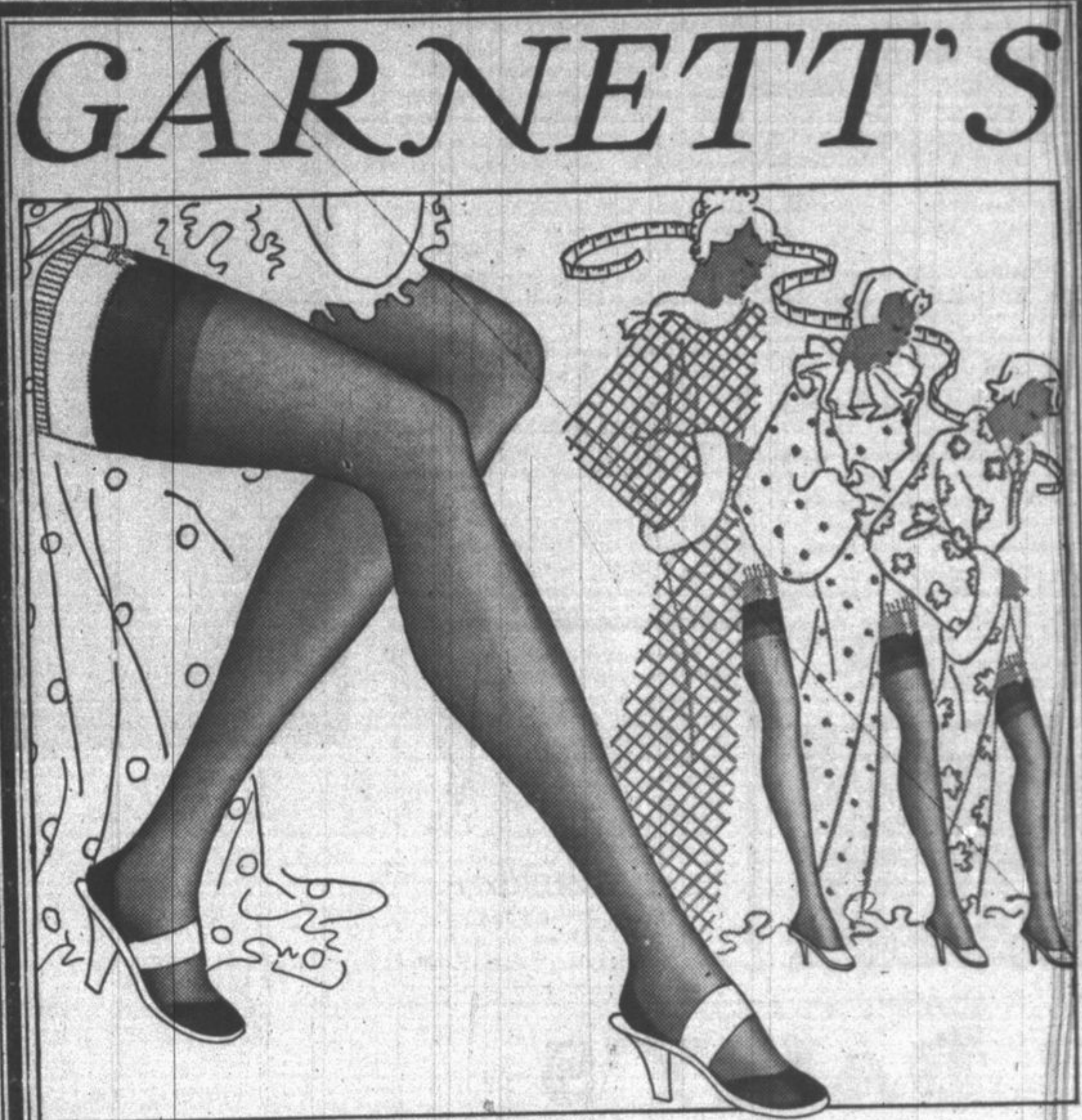
and served for several years on its board of directors. From 1915 to 1920 Mr. Nason was chairman of the Minnesota State Committee of the YMCA serving also as a member of the International Committee, and later was chairman of the Illinois State Committee and a member of the National War Work Council during the war.

In 1918 Mr. Nason removed with

his family to Chicago, where he organized the Natomis Coal Company, the Nason Coal Company, and others, later consolidated into the Illinois Coal and Coke Company, which became the owner and operator of large bituminous coal mining properties in southern Illinois. Mr. Nason returned to St. Paul in 1933 and has lived at 542 Lincoln avenue.
