The ante-bellum days of historic St. Peter's Episcopal Church will be recalled late this afternoon (Thursday) when Rebecca Ann Mather-Smith, of Columbia, Tenn., and Richard Fletcher Baldwin, III, of Fall River, Mass., will be united in marriage in a candle-light ceremony reminiscent of the early days of the church.

The wedding, which unites a scion of a prominent family of the East to a belle of the South and West, is to be performed in the beautiful chapel of the church. The quaintly beautiful church is the outgrowth of the first Episcopal Church in this city, established in 1833 by the reverend, Bishop James H. Otey, first bishop of the diocese of Tennessee. The ivy-clad edifice, erected prior to the Civil War, and conforming to the architecture of that period, was used as a hospital for Federal soldiers during that conflict. Since then, for nearly three-quarters of a century, it has been the scene of religious activities and has witnessed many brilliant weddings, of both the Old South and the New.

The ceremony is to be witnessed by a host of friends of the young couple from all parts of the United States. The ritual will be said by the church rector, the Reverend Henry Bell Hodgkins. The hour will be 5:30 in the afternoon, with only the light of flickering candles, symbolic of a bygone day, to relieve the slowly gathering dusk as the shadows of an early autumn lengthen into night.

The bride, with her attendants, will enter from the left as one faces the altar. The vested choir is to sing the bridal chorus from "Lohengrin," but as the bride enters from the outer cloister, the only music will be that of the organ, played by Miss Camille Herndon, accomplished Columbia musician.

Attending the bride as matrons of honor will be her sisters, Mrs. Richard S. Bull, of Winnetka, and Mrs. James Allen Turner, of the same city. Miss Sara Ann Ridley,

of Columbia, will serve as maid of honor, while bridesmaids will be Mrs. Dudley Onderdonk of Highland Park, Miss Harriet Jones of Columbia, Miss Evelyn Shapard of Columbia, and Miss Doris Laurence-Smith of Oakland, Fla. Flower girls will be neices of the bride, little Jennifer deBujac and Jan-Ann Turner, of Winnetka

Serving as best man will be Walter F. Lineberger, Jr., of Montecito, Calif. The ushers will be John W. Mailliard, III, of San Francisco; Perry A. Brayton, of Fall River, Mass.; E. Carlton Granberry Jr., of Greenwich, Conn.; David Terry Jr. of Little Rock, Ark.; Thomas P. Fletcher Jr. of Little Rock, Ark.; Winthrop Rockefeller of New York City; Walter M. Kremetz Jr. of Orange, N.J.; James Allen Turner of Winnetka; and Francis P. Garvan of Long Island.

The bride will be given in marriage by her father, Charles Frederic Mather-Smith, of Highland Park.

The bride-to-be is the charming and attractive daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Frederic Mather-Smith of Columbia, Highland Park, and Oakland, Fla. A resident of Columbia during the spring and fall seasons since early girlhood, Miss Mather-Smith has endeared herself to a wide circle of friends in Tennessee. An accomplished musician and of much personal charm and magnetism, she is a leader of the younger social group. She has served for two years as president of the Girls' Cotillion Club of Columbia, and is a member of both the Daughters of the American Revolution and the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Mr. Baldwin, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Fletcher Baldwin, II, of Fall River, Mass., and Little Rock, Ark., was educated in private schools and colleges here and abroad. He graduated from the Hotchkiss School, at Lakeville, Conn., in 1930. In 1930 and 1931 he attended the University of Geneva, in Switzerland. For the next three years he attended Yale University. He is a member of the Chi Psi fraternity.
