

### McPherson Holt Will Have Prominent Part In A Play On Oct. 19

McPherson Holt, 1298 North Green Bay Road, Lake Forest, has been announced for a prominent part in "Petticoat Influence," the first of the annual season of plays presented by the Threshold Players of Glencoe in the theater of the Central School of Glencoe. "Petticoat Influence" will be presented on Oct. 19.

Mr. Holt, a director of the North Shore Theatre Guild, is a newcomer to casts of Threshold Players' productions, bringing a fine background of experience in north shore non-professional dramatics to a part in the sparkling comedy of London diplomatic life which made "Petticoat Influence" an outstanding hit of the New York and Chicago seasons three years ago. The work of Mr. Holt as the shel-shocked hero of the North Shore Theatre Guild's production of "The Return of the Soldier" is well remembered by followers of North Shore dramatics.

Nancy Harris Pershall, of Glencoe, whose experience covers several years on the professional stage, plays the lead in the forthcoming play, a part originated by Helen Hayes. Others in the cast are Mrs. Victor A. Spoehr of Glencoe and Sam S. Otis and Thomas H. Ratcliffe, both of Winnetka. James K. Martin, president of the Threshold Players, is directing.

The settings for "Petticoat Influence" are being designed by Norman MacLeish, who is well known in Lake Forest and Highland Park. Mr. MacLeish's ability as a scenic impresario was established by his sets for the Threshold Players productions of "The Tavern" and "Berkley Square," the latter being the play of last season's repertoire in which his wife, Lenore McCall MacLeish, played the leading role.

### North Western Railway Will Speed Up Service

Eighty-two minutes will be cut from the suburban schedules on the Milwaukee Division of the Chicago & North Western Railway, effective with the ending of daylight saving time, Sept. 30, as a part of a program cutting nearly 400 minutes from passenger train schedules which will be carried out by the Chicago & North Western on that day. This is another step in the general plan of speeding up passenger service on the railway.

Five minute cuts will be made on northbound trains and on southbound trains on the Milwaukee Division, while cuts ranging from 1 minute to 3 minutes will be made on 28 other trains.

The same day that these suburban changes go into effect the Chicago & North Western Railway will make major changes affecting the Chicago-Green Bay, Wis. service. "The Pacemaker," 90-minute flyer running between Chicago and Milwaukee, will be pushed up from a 3:45 p.m. leaving time in Chicago to a 9:00 a.m. leaving time, arriving in Milwaukee at 10:30 a.m., and continuing to Green Bay for a 2:20 p.m. arrival. This will cut 45 minutes from the present running time of the morning train to Green Bay from Chicago.

Thirty-minute cuts will be made on Train No. 206 between Green Bay and Chicago and on Train 117, the late night train running between Chicago and upper Michigan. Train 206 will leave Green Bay at 7:00 a.m. instead of 6:30 and will arrive Chicago at 12:05 p.m., as at present.

Changes from 5 to 15 minutes will be made in other through trains.

### Deerfield-Shields Board To Refund To Parents

The Deerfield-Shields Township High School Board of Education will make partial refunds to the parents of high school children in the non-high school district of Lake County, of deposit charges imposed upon those parents two years ago who sent their children to Deerfield-Shields.

This action was taken at a meeting of the board Wednesday evening of last week. It refers to the \$50

deposit paid for each pupil from the non-high school district two years ago, by the parents. Since that time, the non-high school board had made settlement with the Deerfield-Shields board, and the parents will receive all of their refund except \$14.47 each.
