**Boy Scout News**  
SCOUTS AT THE SOUTH POLE  
All Boy Scouts remember the interesting events in the life of Paul Siple, who was representative of the Boy Scouts of America selected as personal aide to Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd on his first expedition to the South Pole in 1928.

Siple is again with Admiral Byrd as chief biologist of the expedition now in progress at Little America. He graduated with honors from Cornell during the time between the two expeditions, and is now to command one of the four exploring parties and will soon start field work for the expedition, using dog sleds and tractors. The trip will involve a 100-day journey to the unexplored regions of the Edsel Ford Mountains, a round trip of from 1,000 to 1,200 miles. Siple's party, in making the journey, will cover the ground part of the sector over which Admiral Byrd plans to fly in October or November. They will be mapping, exploring and examining geographical characteristics, and in the event of a mishap to Admiral Byrd's flying party they will act as a relief party. Among those accompanying Siple will be Scoutmaster Olin Stancliff, an eagle scout of Wesleyville, Pa., and a member of the expedition.

Three other eagle scouts are members of the expedition. They are: Alton Lindsey, an instructor in botany at Cornell University; James Strrett of Beaver Falls, Pa., a former medical student at the University of Pittsburgh; and Joe Hill of Canyon, Texas.

**A FEW FIGURES ABOUT CAMP MA-KA-JA-WAN**  
Camp MaKaJaWan in 1934 produced some interesting statistics. There were a total of 235 Scouts attending camp for a total of 844 Scout Weeks. Combined with the total of 136 Scout Weeks we find that there were a total of 1000 weeks, including 25 parents and friends of scouting who camped for the seventh week the total is brought up to 1055. There were a total of 24,252 meals served to the above number of people and occasional visitors by Mr. Rose, the camp chef, and his assistants. The increase in camping over last year was 23.9% and second period of 1934 was the largest single period in the history of the camp, there being 179 scouts at camp. The camp doctor in his report has produced some rather startling figures. Although no serious accidents occurred the doctor was busy with previous wounds, some blisters, bruises, etc. All combined represented a total of 731 visits to the doctor for treatment. Besides this there is a record of 359 having checked in with the doctor on arrival at camp, and 337 checking out at the end of the camping period. All in all, that makes a total of 1297 visits to the doctor in a six week period.

Scouts were found to have gained weight while at camp. With records of 350 Scouts on hand, 282 of them gained weight for a total of 477½ lbs. Twenty-two Scouts failed to check out with the camp doctor and the remaining 55 did not gain weight. Taking the 477½ lbs. as a net gain for the entire camp we find there was an average of 1.7 lbs. per boy for all boys of 11 lbs. net gain per boy for all boys of 11 lbs. net gain per boy for all boys of 11 lbs.

The merit badge program flourished, a total of 478 merit badges were passed by 428 Scouts in 1934. That represents an increase of 70.7% over 1933. The most popular of the merit badges were cooking, pioneering, camping, personal health, athletics, public health, reptile study, first aid, rowing, bird study, canoeing, life-saving, electricity, swimming and wood carving. Many other merit badges were passed, but were less popular, there being a total of 34 different merit badges studied for an average of 1.2 per Scout. Forty Scouts completed their second class requirements; 42 completed their first class requirements; 28 completed their star requirements; 13 the requirements for life scout; 7 completed their eagle scout rank; and 4 were awarded their eagle scout palms.

**URGE 12-YEAR-OLDS TO JOIN SCOUTS**  
An invitation is extended to all 12-year-old boys to become Scouts. There are many troops in each neighborhood to which boys can apply for membership. Inasmuch as a full program for fall is planned boys will want to lose no time in associating themselves with some Scout troop. A boy must be 12 years of age to be accepted in Scouting, but a program for boys 9, 10 and 11 years of age is provided in Cub Scouts. Cub Scouts are not Scouts, but is a preparatory program for younger boys who will some day want to become Scouts.

**BIG RALLY AND FIELD DAY THIS SATURDAY**  
Saturday morning, Sept. 22, at 9:45 a.m. Cub Scouts and Sea Scouts from the entire North Shore Area Council will gather on the west parking lot of the Teatro Del Lago to participate in an All-Council Rally and Field Day. The day's activities will begin with the taking of moving pictures of the various Cub and Sea Scout units. 12-chapter Boy Scout series, "Young Eagles." The picture has been approved by the National Council, Boy Scouts of America. Besides "Young Eagles" a full length feature, "Rex, King of the Wild Beasts," a Mickey Mouse, and two-reel comedy will be shown.

Mr. Meyers, manager of the Teatro Del Lago has extended this invitation to Cub Scouts, Sea Scouts, and their leaders. Following the picture everyone will have a picnic lunch on the beach, followed by a Scout Field Day and games, until 3:30 p.m.
