Survey of Credit Being Made in the Chicago District

The survey of credit in the Federal Reserve District of Chicago, which was undertaken for the purpose of finding why more loans to small business firms are not being made, is progressing rapidly. The investigation was started in Chicago on Sept. 22, and is to be finished by Sept. 22.

Fifty-four economists and business research specialists are now in the fields in the Seventh Federal Reserve District which includes Iowa, Southern Wisconsin, Northern Illinois, Southern Michigan, and Northern Indiana. They are collecting the facts as to credit from banks and business firms. With the active cooperation of the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago and the hearty endorsement of chambers of commerce, real estate boards, Lions Clubs, Kiwanis Clubs, Rotary, and trade associations, the investigators expect to collect 4,000 cases in the three weeks intensive drive.

Careful examination of these cases, it is hoped, will reveal the extent to which bank credit is not now available to business men, and whether any deficiency that may exist is due to the impaired credit status of would-be borrowers, the desire of banks for liquidity, the exacting standards of bank examiners, the inadequacy of banking resources, or the general state of business.

The tabulation of the data and the interpretation of the results will be done in Washington under the supervision of Dr. Jacob Viner, assistant to the Secretary of the Treasury. The field survey is under the supervision of Dr. C. A. Hardy of the Brookings Institution and Professor S. H. Neelove of the University of Chicago.

Parachute Jumping

That new twin motored, two finned silver monster that has been ripping through our placid sky of late is the Northwest Airways new Lockheed Electra. What a ship! A complete fleet of these high speed ten-passenger airliners now make it possible for the Northwest Airways to fly a schedule from Chicago to Seattle in a little over 12 hours. There's the latest thing on wings!

That New Airliner
Wiley Post, round the world flyer, after reaching the 40,000 foot level last week, is now perfecting his instruments for his flight into the stratosphere.

National Flying Clubs
Flying time and instruction are available to members at cost on a co-operative basis and varies with the type of equipment used. Primary gliders may be flown for \$1 an hour. Flying time in powered planes or with an instructor at 50c a lesson, ranges upward from \$5.50 an hour, dual instruction, and \$8.50 an hour solo flying.
