Local Golfers Win In County Professional and Amateur Events

Sammy Bernardi, of Northmoor Country Club, Highland Park, was the runner-up in the Lake County professional golf tournament held last week at the Glen Flora Country Club, Waukegan.

The winner of the event was Dick Metz, professional at the Albert D. Lasker private course west of Lake Forest. Mr. Metz shot two sensational 18-hole rounds of 74-66 for a total of 140 strokes, four under par, to win. Mr. Bernardi's score was 75-74-149.

The Lake County amateur title was won on the same course last week by Bill Chambers, of Sunset Valley Club, Highland Park, with a 73-72-145, to nose out George Whyte, Glen Flora Club champion, who was one stroke behind, with 71-75.

The best ball pro-amateur Lake County title was won by Tom Carney of Northmoor, and Bill Chambers of Sunset Valley, who had 69-67-136. Tom Kelly of Sunset Valley and George Whyte were second with 67-71-138. Art Olson of Highland Park, the Elks' national amateur champion, was teamed up with Dick Metz, and the two finished third with 73-66-139.

A delegation of 22 golfers from the Deeppath Golf Club, Lake Forest, competed in the event. E. Baldwin and A. Lindenmeyer turned in the best cards, with net scores of 151 and 152 respectively.

Northwestern Will Play Marquette at Evanston Saturday

Northwestern University's football team, hopeful of better fortunes than has been its lot for the past two seasons, will face its first test of the 1934 season Saturday when it opens a gruelling eight game schedule against the formidable Marquette eleven from Milwaukee.

A crowd of 35,000 will witness the season's premiere at Dwyer stadium. Included in the throng will be nearly 5,000 Milwaukee followers of the Hilltoppers, lured by the prospect of seeing their favorites engage the Wildcats in a game which has every indication of being an evenly fought battle from start to finish. Ten thousand Boy Scouts, Y.M.C.A. groups and boys clubs will also attend the game as guests of the university.

There is no question but what Northwestern regards Marquette as a worthy opponent. Coach Frank Murray's teams have been too consistent in their victories over larger schools not to be taken seriously. This year the Hilltoppers, strengthened by the finest array of sophomores in the history of the school, approach the contest in a sanguine mood.

Like Marquette, the Wildcats have taken courage from the early season exploits of a crop of sophomores who appear to have added renewed vigor to their ranks. Both the backfield and line have benefited by these newcomers who have already recalled memories of the halcyon days of '30 and '31 when the Purple reposed at the top of the conference.

Although Coach Dick Hanley contemplates starting an experienced crew against Marquette, there is no doubt but what a number of sophomores will filter their way into the lineup before the game has far advanced.

Bob Swisher, free-striding half-back from Peoria, via the St. John's Military academy, appears to be the only first year player to fill a regular job at this stage of the season. He is established at left half where his speed and shiftness may give the Purple the ball carrying they have been seeking since Pug Renter departed. Swisher is slight of stature, weighing but 160 pounds, but has a lot of drive and once in the open is a real touchdown threat.

John Wisdom Is Killed In Lake Forest Crash

John Wisdom, 21 years old, former Highland resident, was killed instantly early last Saturday when his car got out of control and plunged into a ditch beside Green Bay Road, near Old Elm Road, in Lake Forest.

He was accompanied at the time by Earl A. League and Victor J. H. Robbins, of Fort Sheridan, both of whom escaped with minor injuries. The car was badly damaged.

Mr. Wisdom was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Wisdom, who live on a farm near Half Day. Several sisters also survive.

Funeral services were held at 9:30 Tuesday morning at the St. James Church, Highland, and burial was in the Mooney Cemetery, Highland Park.
