

"The Breadwinner" To Be First Ravinia Players Production

"The Breadwinner," a modern comedy by W. Somerset Maugham, has been selected by the Ravinia Players as the first play of the season, which opens on Friday, Nov. 16. As in past years the performance will be at the Ravinia Village House.

Plans were also made to enlarge the membership of the group this year, and as the first step in this direction an open meeting will be held next Tuesday evening. All people who are interested in joining the group are cordially invited to attend. The place of the meeting has not been set at the time this goes to press, but those interested can find out the meeting place by calling either Highland Park 1364 or 114 after Friday.

The Ravinia Players have decided on a season of four plays, opening Nov. 16, with the second play to be given about the middle of December. The three plays besides "The Breadwinner" will be chosen from among "Private Lives" by Noel Coward, "Let's Be Gay" by Rachel Crothers, "The Late Christopher Bean" by Sidney Howard; "The Dark Tower" by Alexander Woolcott and George Kaufman, "The Meteor" by S. N. Behrman, "When Ladies Meet" by Rachel Crothers, "Michael and Mary" by A. A. Milne, "You and I" by Philip Barry, and "The Queen's Husband."

It has also been announced that season tickets at reduced prices will be put on sale during the next few weeks.

"The Breadwinner" concerns a rich London stockbroker, who meets financial reverses, and although loaned enough money by a friend to save his firm and his reputation decides that ruin and freedom are preferable to saving his reputation and continuing to live in drudgery. The effect of this strike of the family, and on his closest friends, with each trying to explain it in a way involving himself occupies the remainder of the play. The most is made of the opportunities for comedy by the author, who is well known for his light plays and short stories, as well as for his more serious works, such as "Of Human Bondage" the movie of which is before the public at the present time.

The play will be directed by Miss Ruth Card, and the cast will be selected next week.
