

Highland Park Chess Club Beats Waukegan Club By Large Score

Highland Park's 16½ games to Waukegan's 5½ games, was the final score when time was called on the mental heavy-weights at the Moraine Hotel last Monday evening, at the opening round of this winter's inter-suburban chess club tournaments. As this writer had predicted, Highland Park was good. It was almost a case of Waukegan using their pompadors to tickle the tonsils of a wild moose.

Werner Schulze, Carl Haessler, Roger Balke, R. Holt, and H. N. Finch, all of Highland Park, gobbled both of their games — not "smack" like the famous Bosco, but instead, let me assure you, only after exercising considerable stress, strain and strategy — not unlike eating two halves of a lobster, if you know what I mean.

The players of the drawn matches (the 1 to 1) and of the drawn games (½ to ½) are entitled to just as much credit. These situations are like "holding them" at the goal — and to decide to play for a draw instead of a win, often involves some of the finest points of chess — and of eating lobsters.

A note of discord temporarily marred the smooth tempo of the evening. It seems that Roger Balke, our talented musician and musical theorist, put on a false red beard just before his match. This frightfully frustrated his opponent, R. Dennelt of Waukegan, who thought our Roger was flying the red foul flag before crossing the starting line; and, unlike Mr. Sopwith, Mr. Dennelt further protested that fighting from behind a big red bush was Indian fighting, and insisted that Roger stand out and fight fairly. Nothing could be found in the rules about this — the rules of chess being particularly antiquated. Roger was so disturbed momentarily that he went to the music room of the Moraine, played half of a Brahms' Symphony on the grand piano to become becalmed and to present to perfect symmetry the mathematical molecules of his mind. But when Mr. Dennelt found his protest to the rules committee completely ignored, he saw red every time he looked up from the board, consequently he fouled his Greta Garbo, lost his Charlie Chaplin overboard completely, and set his Mae West as a wind break instead of a stay-stail. Roger had things pretty much his own way — whether he had an extra pawn or two concealed in the beard I do not know — and he slipped over his 2 to 0 victory, smoothly, smilingly.

Legion Auxiliary Card Party Will Be Oct. 10

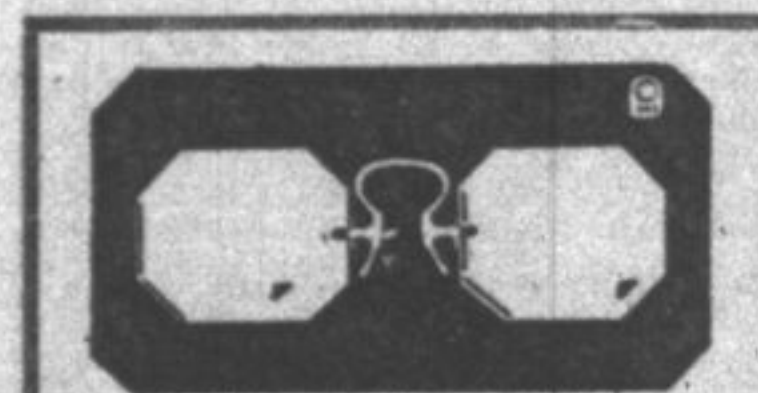
