

### Carnival of the Air at Curtis-Reynolds Airport Oct. 4, 5, 6, 7

Patrons of the air show to be held at Curtis-Reynolds Airport Oct. 4, 5, 6 and 7 will get all the thrills and chills that attend a major air show with the possibility of some "wash-outs," for many of the outstanding race and stunt pilots of the world will be present to vie with each other for new and costlier laurels. The Chicago Carnival of the Air, as it is officially designated, is the only major sky event of the year in Chicago.

Jimmy Mattern, famous round-the-world flyer, who in his last attempt was lost in Siberia, will compete with Major James H. Doolittle, Seheilled cup winner in 1925, the last time the United States held the race, and flyer deluxe for the Shell Oil Company, and Art Goebbel, speed pilot who has won his laurels in the speed lanes of the air, for new titles and new speed records.

In 1931, when outside loops were considered suicidal a young man by the name of Lieut. Roy (Butterfinger) Hunt, of Oklahoma City, took his little white monoplane into the air one day and confounded all the experts by performing 124 of the so-called "death loops" in one flight. Lieut. Hunt, now a member of the Observation Squadron, 8th Corps, will be present at the carnival to demonstrate the technique of "deadstick" landing and show his happy faculty of performing outside loops without attendant disaster.

Then there will be Harold Neuman, of Cleveland, holder of the balloon bursting record of six and one-fifth seconds made at the National Air Races in 1930, who will enter the dog fights and power dives. Neuman has frequently achieved speeds upward of 350 miles per hour in the dives.

### Northwestern to Play Iowa Next Saturday

Iowa next! That is the objective in Northwestern University's football camp this week as preparations get underway for the opening of the Big Ten season against the Hawkeyes at Dwyer stadium Saturday.

Iowa. Now that name rangles the Wildcats, who but a short 12 months ago suffered a 7 to 0 defeat at the hands of the Hawkeyes in the opening game of the 1933 season. Northwestern was the first team to feel the power of the revived Iowans, who continued on to smashing victories over Wisconsin and Purdue.

It was a complacent, confident Wildcat eleven that faced the Hawkeyes at Soldier Field last fall. The Purple was still thinking in terms of the sweeping 44 to 6 victory over Coach Ossie Solem's boys the previous year. But they had not taken into consideration that smashing, plunging sophomore fullback, Dick Crayne, who ripped through the Wildcat line and prepared the way for Joe Laws' touchdown sprint from the 20 yard line.

This year it is different. The Wildcats know they have a real battle on their hands and are preparing for it accordingly. In fact, based upon comparative records of last season, the Hawkeyes will enter the game favorites to ring up their second victory in a row over the Purple.

But the Purple haven't surrendered by any means. While Saturday's opener with Marquette displayed a number of weaknesses which must be remedied, there were unmistakable signs that the 1934 Wildcat is of a harder species than the docile feline of '33.

New blood injected by a brace of dashing sophomores has added boldness to the Wildcat attack. For the first time since the days of Rentner, the Purple can boast a dangerous aerial attack. This was demonstrated in the Marquette game when the Wildcats completed 7 out of 10 passes for a total of 156 yards.
