Prof. Lindeman Talks At Lincoln School On The American Crisis

"We have as our heritage in America the ancient dream of working out our social destiny by consent, rather than by coercion. That dream, Work, among other things. although it is still evoked so frequently, has become a mirage. It ceased to be true in the Jacksonian Fall Term of Dancing era, when power was momentarily wrested away from the vested interests, and placed again in the hands a dictatorship."

This was one of the points brought classes at the Y. out in the stirring address delivered ning at the Lincoln School.

crisis is an historic epic which calls in size. for adjustments so fundamental that change is permitted to come thru if only we can revive the sense of freedom through education, if only we can develop a sense of social responsibility, we may stop this cataclysm in time."

Then Prof. Lindeman went on say, "But in order to do that we must have a revaluation in our ideals of education, and we must learn what true freedom means. All the people in this country must have the Dutch Maid Laundry freedom to work, all the children in this country must have the freedom to attend school. If we want real freedom of competitive enterprise, we must see that with every increase in production there comes a corresponding increase in wages so that the extra amount of goods produced can be bought up by the people for whom it was produced. If there is dry service, a full dry cleaning servto be true competitive freedom, we must really eliminate child labor. (In spite of codes under the NRA. there are still about one million children employed in industry.) In effect, if we choose the peaceful method of change, we must plan.

"And that involves a complete overhaul of our educational system.We need, not more colleges and vocational schools, but more schools of life, where young men and women go to learn the relation between their own personalities and the world about them. They must learn that difference is the essence of life, and that, as Goethe said, what one agrees with, leaves him unchanged. We only learn from those who are different from ourselves."
