Exhibition of Light To Be Given Oct. 24 and 25 In Deerfield

Much of the mystery and magic of light, as well as the harmful and beneficial effects it has upon the human eye, are entertainingly portrayed in the Exhibition of Light which the Public Service Company is conducting this Fall throughout the territory it serves.

The exhibition is called "The Modern Magic of Light" and it will be presented in Deerfield on Oct. 24 and 25 at the Deerfield Grammar School auditorium. Performances will be given at 8 o'clock p.m.

After considerable experimenting, lighting experts of the Public Service Company have developed unique demonstrating equipment for the purposes of this exhibition. One feature of this equipment, called the "shadow box," offers a spectacular method of bringing before the audience the most interesting and least known peculiarities of light, color, shadows and showing the effect of these factors, separately and in com-

bination upon the eye. Demonstration of the "shadow box" is included in each performance of the Exhibition of Lighting where it is accompanied by a discussion of light and its relation to eyesight.

A further feature of unusual interest is an amusing one-act playlet, with a cast of five people, which illustrates the practical use of light in the home and the value of proper lighting to growing children and adults as well. The amusing action of the play evolves around a bridge game in which a guest with all good intentions misreads her cards, overbids her hand, and upsets the efforts of her grouchy host for a grand slam.

A table lamp is given to some member of the audience at each performance. There is no charge for admission.
