A Unique Library
A library containing copies of books burned in Germany over a year ago was recently opened in Paris in the presence of distinguished French literary figures, German refugees and two men identified by speakers as members of the German Embassy staff. The famous writer, Heinrich Mann, is president of the international committee which collected more than 20,000 copies of volumes destroyed at ceremonial burnings in the Reich. Helen Keller, Albert Einstein, Emil Ludwig and Leon Trotsky are among the living authors whose books are in the library.

The Author of "Mr. Chips"
James Hilton, author of "Goodbye, Mr. Chips," was winner of the Hawthornden prize for 1933. The Hawthornden prize is England's most coveted literary award. It is awarded to the best novel of the year by an author under the age of forty. "Lost Horizon" by James Hilton, a new edition of which appears this month, was awarded the prize for 1933.
