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Nursery Stock Will Be Sold at Auction Oct. 30

Ten thousand dollars was invested in young nursery stock planted in the nursery adjoining the Northshore Garden of Memories during the first year of the depression. For reasons familiar to everybody the sale of nursery stock has been slow. All of the land around this cemetery and nursery, and for some distance is platted into building lots and sold to widely separated purchasers. Hence, there is no opportunity to buy adjoining ground for transplanting purposes. To date none of this stock is injured by crowding, but it will be injured if not thinned soon.

Therefore the experiment of an auction sale on nursery stock is to be tried on Oct. 30. This will give all cemeteries, nurseries, corporations and individuals having ground which ought to be planted an excellent opportunity to secure trees and shrubs fresh from the ground in a well kept nursery at bargain prices.

This nursery was started when ground was broken for the beginnings of the cemetery seventeen years ago and important additions have been made annually. Hence the present assortment contains practically all the desirable varieties of trees, evergreens and shrubs now in favor with landscape gardeners, cemetery and park superintendents, nurserymen and private estate builders in the northern states.

Trees and shrubs will be sold in blocks of ten or more to the highest cash bidders, but special arrangements may be made by responsible parties.

Deerfield Board Has Special Meeting

A special meeting of the Deerfield Village Board was held Monday evening with Mayor Harry Clavey, the corporation counsel, George McGaughey, and all six trustees and the village clerk present.

The meeting was for the purpose of passing an ordinance authorizing the clerk to have any special assessments for which there are no buyers at the tax sale to be held at Waukegan, to revert back to the village of Deerfield, instead of going to the state.
