Y.M.C. ELEVEN WILL PLAY EVANSTON TEAM

Locals Lose First Game Last Sunday to a Chicago Heights Team

Suffering a 6-0 defeat in their opening grid contest with Chicago Heights, Highland Parkers might say the Young Men's Club football team is off on the wrong foot for the 1934 season. They are, but not for long, for the local squad resumed practice this week in a fighting mood for this Sunday's game with the Evanston V. F. W. team.

Evanston, a strong contender for the North Shore championship, comes to Highland Park with a record of four games won this season and one tied. They pack a powerful punch and meet nothing but the best and toughest on the gridiron field.

In four games they have met and defeated the Chicago Heights team, 7-0; Lloyd's A. C., 12-0; Traver's all-Chicago team, 12-6, and were held to a scoreless tie by Glencoe, 0-0, in a night game last week. Last Sunday was the first time they have been scored upon this year, showing obvious defensive strength.

Their scores against their opponents show 21 points to nothing for their rivals, showing little in offensive power, although they have it. Their squad is made up of former Evanston high school stars and several college luminaries. Among those of prominence are Jack Foley, quarterback, from Illinois, and incidentally a former Deerfield-Shields student; Branstrom, of DePaul University, a tackle; O'Keefe, also of Illinois, a center; Grabowski, of Lane Tech, a fullback; and Mundellus, a former All-State fullback from Evanston high school. The team averages 170 pounds, the line 175 pounds and the backfield 160. They are coached by Bus Owen and Jackie Sullivan. Sullivan starred at Northwestern University last year.

Highland Park, with a few additions, will lineup the same, with the exception of Bob Childs who is out with an injured leg. Art Bock and "Deer" Stipe will be at ends; Williams and Hook Kress, tackles; H. Foreman, Jr. and Ed Gansberg, guards; and Emmett Fitzgerald at center.

Ollie Olson will start at the quarterback position in place of Childs, a switch in the lineup. Bill Lutz and Carl Becker at halves and Les Allens at fullback.

In addition to these players the Young Men's Club will have Stan Bodman, Otto Hills, Schumacher, Bender and Dick Hall, all of Illinois; Saluski and Opasik of Indiana University; and Patrick and Coogan drafted from the East Chicago Gophers. Most of these players were with the team last year, but did not appear in the opening game. Coogan will be remembered for his passing when his team, the East Chicago Gophers, defeated the Highland Park team 14-0 last year.

Fred Gilles, the Y.M.C. coach last year, will also be on hand to direct the team against Evanston Sunday. He will be assisted by S. L. Reinhardt of Highland Park.

A large crowd is expected to attend the game due to the large following that the Evanston team has. The game will be a good one, so don't fail to see it.

\$2400 Remains to Be Raised in the Hospital Campaign

Workers are redoubling their efforts to obtain the necessary subscriptions to put the drive "over the top" and an appeal has been made to every Highland Park citizen who has not subscribed to support the drive by purchasing one or more of the service certificates.

"With a continuation through this week of the earnest work of the captains and workers in the campaign, and the cooperation of citizens who have not yet purchased certificates we hope we can report that the full \$10,000 has been raised by this week-end," Mr. Sihler said. "We are convinced that every Highland Park resident will recognize the necessity of the success of the drive and do their part to insure it."

The hospital service certificates are redeemable in hospital service within the year following their purchase. The money that is paid for them is not a donation to the hospital but simply, in effect, an advance payment on hospital service.

Current Events Talks on Tuesday Evenings

The announcement in last week's issue of The Press that Clifton Utley would give a course of four lectures in Highland Park has been enthusiastically received by those interested in affairs of the day, at home and abroad.

Mr. Utley is director of the Chicago Council on Foreign Affairs, and editor of "Foreign Notes," a pamphlet published fortnightly by the Council. He was educated at the University of Chicago, and has studied at several European universities. He is not only a recognized authority on his subject, but is in addition known as a speaker gifted with a charming knack of presenting his information. Those who have heard him once consider it a rare privilege to have the opportunity of hearing him again. Particularly at the present time it is of interest to have some one as cognizant of national and international affairs as Mr. Utley analyze current events from an unbiased viewpoint.

In bringing Mr. Utley to Highland Park, the Rector's Guild of the Trinity Episcopal Church, has been conscious of the fact that the men of the community would also be interested in hearing a speaker of Mr. Utley's prominence, and have therefore arranged that these talks be given in the evenings at the leisurely hour of 8:30.

Realizing that lectures of this type are more enjoyable and satisfactory when presented to small groups in an informal manner rather than to a large audience in a formal speech, the committee has chosen to have Mr. Utley speak at the parish guild hall where the seating capacity is of course limited. MOTHER, FATHER AND 3 BABIES EVICTED

Social Service Makes Appeal for Assistance for This and Other Local Cases

A mother and father and three babies were evicted this week, we are told by the Highland Park Social Service. At present temporary shelter has been obtained with the grandfather, who is already caring for a daughter and family.

"Three households in one home. We are anxious to find a few rooms for this family. They will need a gas stove. Has any one a stove to spare?" the Social Service asks.

A young couple with one child meet their depression problem by placing the child with the grandparents and working as a couple all summer for little more than their expenses. That grandmother died a month ago. There is a baby coming and another solution to the problem becomes necessary. The husband has obtained part time employment; he is not on relief, nor is asking to be, but needs some help to furnish a few rooms comfortably as his wages barely cover living expenses. "Have you a rug, a table, a comfortable chair, some dishes or cooking utensils? These will encourage this little family to continue the struggle to keep off the relief roll. Give them a helping hand," is the appeal.

"How would you feel if you were a widow with no means of support and two dependents, one of them sick?"

"Would you feel grateful for the opportunity to live in a shabby house, rent free, even if the walls were damp and dingy and the roof leaked like a sieve? We know a woman who has smiled through these very conditions. Thanks to Social Service the walls have some fresh paper, and the roof leaks have been stopped with building paper furnished by money made in the Social Service sewing room and put on by friends. But a new problem is at hand. That old heating stove which did service for some years before its present location, has at last refused to serve. Is anyone interested in filing that particular need? A ten dollar bill will do it," is the announcement.
