

Candidates Will Be Introduced Monday Evening in Ravinia

In view of the nearness of election, it is hoped that a large proportion of the residents of Highland Park and Ravinia will attend the open meeting, sponsored by the League of Women Voters, to be held at the Ravinia Village House, Monday evening, Oct. 29, at 8 o'clock, at which the candidates for county and state offices will be permitted to present their qualifications for office, we are told by the League of Women Voters.

The opening meeting of the League was attended by more than a hundred women eager to learn why the state constitution is in need of a change. After the usual luncheon, and a presentation of plans for the coming year by the committee chairman, Mrs. Gaidzik, chairman of the program committee, introduced the speaker, Robert Spindell, a Chicago attorney.

According to Mr. Spindell, who has spent years in studying the situation the present constitution is in many ways inadequate. The article on revenue, placing the major burden on real estate is in crying need of a change which would distribute the burden, and result in a greater income to the state treasury.

The judicial districts are badly apportioned, and a change is needed which would eliminate duplication of work, provide centralization of authority and greater efficiency of operation. Other needs are a change in bank stockholders' liability, and in the administration of criminal justice.

The best method of changing the constitution is by means of a constitutional convention, and when this matter is brought before the voters of the state, it is urgent that

they vote for a body of intelligent men who will incorporate into the constitution those changes which are so badly needed.
