

**Qualifications and Records of G.O.P. Candidates Given**

With all state, congressional and county Republican candidates swinging into their fall campaign, the voters of Highland Park, Lake Forest and other shore town communities are today joining the rest of the county in examining the records of the entire Republican party ticket.

Many non-partisan voters from the North Shore communities have come out openly for the Republican party candidates after carefully considering the qualifications of the candidates of both parties.

Property owners in the cities in Lake county, farmers, clerks, laborers and business men have voiced their approval of the Republican party candidates.

The qualifications and records of these candidates are as follows:



William J. Stratton, candidate for State Treasurer, was Secretary of State from 1929 to 1933, inaugurating the policy of earning and paying into the State Treasury interest on the receipts of his office. During this period, when 600 banks within the state closed their doors, he demonstrated his good judgment and painstaking care in selecting depositories by accounting for and paying into the State Treasury every penny of principal and interest which passed through his hands, amounting to about \$80,000,000.



Francis G. Blair, candidate for Superintendent of Public Instruction, was born in Nashville, Washington county, Illinois, Oct. 30, 1864. He is a graduate of the Illinois State Normal University and of the Swarthmore College, Swarthmore, Pa. Has LL.D. Degrees from Colgate College and Wesleyan University, and granted Dr. of Education Degree from Rhode Island State College. He married Lillian Caton, of LeRoy, Illinois in 1898. They have two sons. Mr. Blair has been Superintendent of Public Instruction for the State of Illinois since 1906.



C. Wayland Brooks, candidate for Congressman-at-Large, is a true son of Illinois. Born in Bureau county. Educated in the public schools. Attended Illinois, Chicago and Northwestern Universities. Decorated four times for bravery in the World War. Has established an enviable record as a lawyer. He has proven his courage, ability and integrity as a public servant in war and in peace. He has a fine analytical mind and is an orator of dynamic force.



Milton E. 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**Classes in Adult Education to Start on Thursday, Nov. 8**

The adult education classes which were instituted last year at Lincoln School, under auspices of the Lincoln School P.T.A., will reopen on Thursday, Nov. 8, at 7:30.

The following classes have been organized with which to begin the season: pottery, metal work, drawing, painting, manual training, language classes (French and Spanish) dancing (tap and ballroom), book reviews.

There has been some demand for instruction in sewing, weaving, glee club, citizenship, speech and orchestra.

If the groups desiring work in these subjects become sufficiently large the classes can be arranged at

any time during the season.

The committee feels confident that the enthusiastic participation of last year and the interest shown by the many newcomers, can only be interpreted to mean that these opportunities, offered at such nominal fees, are filling a long felt want in the community.

The classes will meet once a week on Thursday evenings for a period of 30 weeks. For those in School District 108 the cost will be 50 cents a month, \$2.50 for the entire term of 20 weeks, or \$3 if paid in advance. The cost for those not in the school district will be 60 cents per month, \$3 for the term, \$2.50 if paid in advance; guest fee for one evening, 25 cents.
