


Shall an Act of the General Assembly of Illinois entitled "An Act to provide for an issue of bonds of the State of Illinois for the relief of indigent persons and for the redemption of notes issued in anticipation of taxes levied for that purpose, enacted by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly at the first special session thereof, which in substance authorizes the State to provide funds for the relief of residents who are destitute and in necessitous circumstances and for the redemption and retirement of notes issued for such purposes and to contract a debt and issue \$30,000,000 of serial bonds for such purposes, such bonds to bear interest at not to exceed six per cent; levies a tax sufficient to pay said interest as it accrues and to pay off said bonds within 20 years from issuance, but provides that such payments may be made from other sources of rexenue and require certain moneya allotted to counties and municipalities under the "Motor Fuel Tax Law" to be first used for the payment of the several counties' portion thereof and such direct tax to be omitted in any year in which sufficient money from other sources of revenue has been appropriated to meet such payments for such year; provides for publication and for submission to the people; maker the provisions for payment of such interest and bonds irrepealable and pledges faith of State to the making of such payments; go into full force and effect?
