Work Projects Will Provide Employment for Lake County Men

More than 180 unemployed men in five Lake County towns will benefit from a series of work relief projects approved by the work division of the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission.

The projects are in Highland Park, Highwood, North Chicago, Waukegan, and Winthrop Harbor.

In Highland Park, 32 workers will be assigned to the park district and 19 to School District No. 108 to make improvements on grounds and buildings.

A corps of 19 relief workers will repair streets and replace sidewalks in Highwood; in North Chicago 86 workers will be assigned to repair water mains and install new water distributing equipment. The village buildings and roads will be repaired in Winthrop Harbor. In Waukegan electrical repairs on the city's public buildings will be made by a group of unemployed electricians.

Ralph Church Urges Reopening of Great Lakes Naval Station

The immediate reopening of the Great Lakes Naval Training Station was strongly urged by Ralph E. Church, Republican candidate for representative in Congress from the tenth district in a speech delivered at Waukegan recently. He believes that the quick resumption of activities at this important naval base will benefit all of his district in general and Lake County in particular.

The reopening of the Great Lakes Station is only one of a number of constructive planks which go to make up the program of Mr. Church. His platform is producing much favorable comment and many offers of active support.

Another plank in Mr. Church's platform has caught the popular fancy of his district. It is the plank in which he pledges himself to do everything within his power when he goes to Washington to urge that Congress immediately resume all of its legal duties and powers as our representative law-making body. Three prizes will be offered for the grade school and two for the high school. In addition to this, through the courtesy of the local radio station WCBF the children winning first prize will broadcast their essays.

The best essay from each school will be submitted to the office of the Tuberculosis Association by noon on Saturday, Nov. 24.

W. C. Petty, county superintendent of schools, will be one of the judges of the essays. The other two judges and the prizes will be announced later.
