The Lady Elks Social Club held their annual luncheon yesterday, at the Glen Gables tea room, in Glencoe.

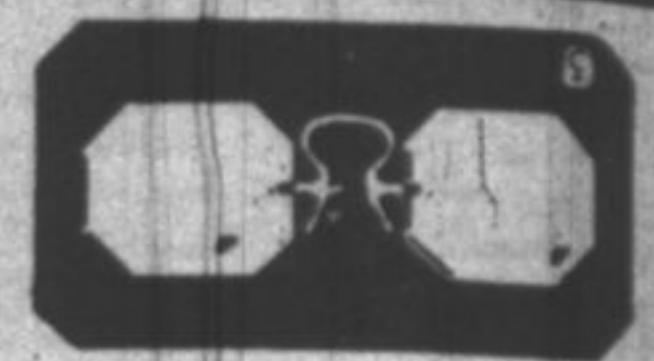
