

**Scout Troops Earn 10-Year Program Awards**

Announcement that many troops, Sea Scout "Ships" and Cub Packs of the North Shore Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America will earn the coveted 1934 Ten Year



program award of the Boy Scouts of America has been made by Henry Fowler, president. A medallion will be made available to these troops.

The Ten Year program, as established by the Boy Scouts of America at the beginning of 1933, is described as a challenge to every Boy Scout troop in the nation to maintain a high-quality, year-round program, so that the interests of its members will be retained for at least a four-year period. With the ultimate goal of the program realized at the end of 1942, one out of every four boys in America of Scout age will have been a Scout and will have come under the influence of all the varied aspects of the Scout program for a period of four or more years.

This program of development affects 30,390 Boy Scout troops and 1,780 Cub Packs in all parts of the United States and its possessions. Mr. Fowler pointed out that the successful carrying forward of this program involves the time and energies of 209,067 volunteer leaders in the movement.

The award medallion is designed to be displayed on the flagstaff of the colors of the troop which earn it. It is a handsome golden and blue enamel metal shield shaped to fit on the flagstaff. The design includes a replica of the Boy Scout insignia crossed by the date "1934." Beneath is the inscription "Ten Year Program Award—1933-1942." To earn the emblem a Scout troop must carry on an exceptional program throughout the year and maintain high standards in relation to attendance, membership, camping, hiking, civic service, health and others of the numerous activities of the Scout program.

Anyone having a coal or wood burner to spare may be assured that it will be given to an appreciative home where it is truly needed. Social Service does not give these things, but men receiving aid of this kind, in turn help some one else in a difficulty which Social Service has to meet.
