Highwood Indians Tie Waukegan Boosters, 7-7

The Waukegan Tavern Boosters scored the first touchdown of the game during the last 4 minutes of play of the first half last Sunday to tie the Highwood Indians, 7-7.

Waukegan tried two end runs which put them on the 20-yard line, then they advanced to the 4-yard line. Waukegan threw a pass which was incomplete but the second pass was completed over the goal line for the first score of the game. The extra point was good. Waukegan gained a great deal of yardage through accurate passing by their fullback.

Highwood, in the second half, started its powerful drive on the field, off-tackle smashes netting on the average of 5 to 10 yards, but there were numerous penalties. On the kick-off, Highwood got the ball on the 30-yard line and brought it to the 50-yard line. Three successive long gains through the line brought the ball to the 10-yard line, and with Carlson carrying the ball on the third down he went over for

a touchdown. Brass converted for the extra point.

Carlson, Bartlett, and Cooney ripped off long gains through Brass's side of the line, who played a bang up game at tackle and did a very fine job of punting for Highwood. Bartlett tried a wide sweeping end run and went over for a touchdown but only to be brought back because of a Highwood man caught clipping and was penalized 15 yards. O'Connor threw a pass to England in the end zone but missed and Highwood lost the ball, and no scoring or threatening to score came about in the last quarter.

Coach O'Connor played quarterback in place of Bernardini who suffered a leg injury against Highland Park.

Coach Fred Gilles has a difficult task in reshaping his team, but is confident that after Highland Park has mastered its signals, they will be ready to go places. Lack of signal practice on behalf of the entire team has resulted in spotty offensive work so far this year.

Last Sunday Highland Park Y.M.C. emerged victorious by a score of 13-6 over the flashy Evanston V.F.W. at the local field. The aid of Bodman, Hill and Hall on defense com-

bined with the splendid work of Saluski and Coogan in the backfield showed considerable improvement over the previous Sunday. The punting of Bodman and Olson was of high caliber. The team play during the last quarter showed more of the 1933 championship form than any time so far this year.


