**Illinois Library Association**

More than 200 librarians and library trustees are expected in Decatur, Ill., Oct. 31 to Nov. 2, for the thirty-eighth annual conference of the Illinois Library Association, to be held at the Orlando Hotel. Presiding at the conference will be the president of the association, Miss Anna May Price, superintendent of the State Library Extension Division.

The conference is scheduled to open Wednesday afternoon, Oct. 31, with a general session at which "Adequate Book Collections for Present Day Service" will be the topic of discussion.

Trustees, and groups of librarians interested in special types of library work such as work with children, college and reference service and library records will hold section meetings Thursday morning. Local history in the Highland Park Public Library will be presented by Miss Hendee at this session. Apparently one of the most important sessions is to be held Thursday afternoon, when "A Library System for Illinois" will be discussed by a librarian, representatives of the fair and home bureau, a layman and a member of the state legislature. At this meeting Mr. M. F. Gallagher, vice president of the Highland Park Public Library board and a member of the legislative committee, will present proposed library legislation for general discussion and approval by members of the Illinois Library Association.

A dinner conference is to follow this session, at which Lyman Bryson, an outstanding leader in adult education will discuss "Is Thinking Recreation?" "Putting the National Library Plan To Work" will be the subject of the final general session Friday morning, November 2.

The October issue of Roto; The National Picture Magazine, which has recently come to the library, shows the name of David Alan Munro as the editor. Mr. Munro is a well-known Highland Park man.

**"Vote Yes" Is Plea Of Deerfield P.T.A.**

Divisional meeting of the North Shore Division of the Illinois State Teacher's Association at Evanston. Mrs. Muhle quotes from the October "Illinois Voter":

**Constitutional Convention**  
"Our present revenue system places an unjust share of taxes on real estate and this serious condition will continue until the revenue article of the Constitution is revised. In order to call a convention it is necessary that the proposition must receive a Majority Vote of All Those Voting in the Election. Do Not Fail to Vote on this Proposition! Some of the most necessary changes are: revision of the revenue system, home rule for cities and counties in local affairs, reorganization of the judicial system, more equitable representation shorter ballot."
