the election contest committee. Russ' Alford, Democratic candidate for county clerk in the election just past, last week filed a petition for a writ of mandamus to certify him as elected. This was filed the day before the canvassing board completed the canvass in which County Clerk Lew A. Hendee was returned the winner by 147 votes. In his petition, Mr. Alford asks that 100 votes be deducted from the Hendee total in precinct 2 in Avon Township (Round Lake) and that 192 votes be given Mr. Alford in precinct 2 in Deerfield Township

(Highwood city hall) which would return Mr. Alford as the winner. If the petition is not allowed, then the election contest committee will proceed with the contest on both the county clerk and sheriff races.
