Mrs. George C. Greene, 22 North Linden Avenue, passed away Friday at 8 p.m. in the Highland Park Hospital after an illness of five weeks.



She was before her marriage Miss Edna Gates, and was born Jan. 14, 1869, at Turtle, Rock County, Wis., the daughter of William and Frances Gates of New York state, pioneer settlers in Rock County. She was a graduate of the Beloit, Wis., High School and of Olivet College, Olivet, Mich., and taught for a number of years.

On Aug. 12, 1896, she was married at her home in Turtle, Wis., to Mr. George C. Greene, who was born in Constantinople, Turkey. Mr. Greene has been a teacher in Lane Technical High School, Chicago, for 25 years.

Mr. and Mrs. Greene have four children: Dr. Lois Dixon Greene, associate professor of surgery and professor in the department of otolaryngology in the Hunan Yale Medical College in Changsha, Hunan Province, China; Mrs. Frances Elizabeth Greene Riley, art teacher in the Detroit schools; Alden Gates Greene, who teaches chemistry in the Proviso Township High School in Maywood, Ill.; and Davis Child Greene, who is in the insurance business.

One sister and three brothers preceded Mrs. Greene in death. Her eldest sister, who died at the age of 83, was buried a week ago Sunday. One sister, Miss Lois Gates, of Beloit, is the surviving member of the family.

Funeral services were held Monday morning at 11 o'clock in the First Presbyterian Church of Highland Park, the Rev. Louis W. Sherwin officiating.

The pallbearers were Lawrence Mills, Lyle Gourley, E. V. Mccogni, Raymond Flinn, Howell W. Murray and Bert Lech. Burial was in the family cemetery in Clinton, Wis.

Mrs. Greene was one of the first secretaries of the Deerfield-Shields High School Parent Teacher Association, and was a member of the board of education of the Elm Place School for nine years. She was a member of the Highland Park Woman's Club for many years.

Mrs. Edward V. Price Dies At The Age of 80
