

Dean Heilman and Charles Postle Are Speakers Last Week

Dean Ralph E. Heilman of the Commerce School of Northwestern University and Charles Postle of the Post Health Clubs opened the winter season for the Men's Club at the Highland Park Presbyterian Church with a most successful meeting on last Thursday evening.

A record attendance was on hand to hear these outstanding speakers, in fact the largest first night attendance in the club's history.

Dean Heilman's subject was "Economic Planning—Is It a Panacea?" It was refreshing to hear this subject discussed by one who could approach the subject scientifically and without any prejudice due to political connections.

In discussing the present economic situation and the program of a planned economy, the speaker pointed out some of the practical problems of such a program, and warned of the impossibility of such a program to provide for future developments along particular lines.

For a specific example Dean Heilman took the automotive industry. He raised the question as to whether such a central planning board would have allowed pioneer efforts to continue in fact of the then considered enormous investments in harness manufacturing, buggy manufacturing and related industry.

In concluding his address the speaker warned that while a planned economic program had many things to commend it, that to him it still seemed impractical to substitute a central planning board for our present scheme of individual initiative and enterprise.

Mr. Postle's message was especially directed to the executive brain worker, in business, over thirty-five years of age.

In an interesting and forceful manner he presented a program of conditioning for business men, based on his successful specialization in this field during the past twenty-odd years.

His program included a set of simple exercises for the first thing each morning, a new, to most people, but simple diet program and the need for a brisk walk each evening before retiring.

Such a program, according to the speaker makes for greater vitality, better health, constant weight control at proper point for each individual and an increased span of useful life.

The next meeting of the club is scheduled for Dec. 19. Silas H. Strawn will be the guest speaker at that meeting and George Lott, the famous tennis star, is going to tell about the recent Davis Cup matches.

Future speakers for the new year include Branch Rickey of the St. Louis Cardinals and Harry Wheeler of Chicago.
