

### DEERFIELD CAGE TEAM WINS EIGHT STRAIGHT

Defeats University High 45-8; Lights Win in Overtime; Proviso Next

Defeating University High 45-8 the Deerfield-Shields varsity basketball team stretched its winning run to 8 successive victories. The game played last Friday in the local high school gym was a rather drab affair with the Deerfield boys completely outclassing their rivals.

However, the light weight team had to play two over time periods before finally winning their game by an 18-16 count. This victory avenged the defeat handed out to them by the Chicago lads last week.

On Friday night, Dec. 21, the local five will travel to Maywood where they will engage Proviso in their second league tilt.

So far this season Proviso's varsity team has not been defeated in league competition. Last Friday evening Proviso beat a weak New Trier team 29-23 while the week before they triumphed over Morton High of Cicero.

Proviso's team is supposed to be headed for the Suburban League title but the Deerfield cagers will be a hard outfit to stop, it is predicted. Friday evening the Deerfield varsity won its first league title by defeating Waukegan 19-15.

Proviso's "pony" team so far has not won a league game being beaten by both New Trier and Morton.

With a 19-15 victory over Waukegan under their belt the Deerfield "lights" will be the favorites to win this game.

### Table Tennis Matches to Be Played Jan. 6

Coleman Clark, the Chicago District's only former national champion, will captain the United States team in the international table tennis matches against Hungary to be played at the Stevens Hotel, January 6, according to Reginald G. Hammond of Highland Park, chairman of the ranking committee of the United States Table Tennis association.

Other members of the team are Jimmy McClure of Indianapolis, national ping-pong champion; Billy Condy of New Trier High School, who recently successfully defended his Chicago district title; Max Rushakoff, runner-up to Condy and a former Chicago champion, and Edward Dugan, a newcomer to high ranking table tennis. Paul Pearson and Edwin Lewis, who as a Hyde Park High School team won national doubles honors here two years ago, have been picked as the doubles team.

Viktor Barna of Paris and Sandor Glancz of Budapest, the Hungarians who will uphold the honors of their country in the coming matches are now on board the Ile-de-France, which is due to arrive in New York Monday (Dec. 24). These two amateur stars who are outstanding members of the world champion Hungarian team have just completed an exhibition tour of Africa. It will be their first appearance in America and there is much speculation as to how our best players will compare with them. Leading European critics expect the Hungarians to defeat our leading players without any difficulty. Those who have seen national champion McClure in action cannot believe that this is possible and are waiting for the matches at the Stevens Hotel to settle this.

### Plan to Keep Ravinia Rink Open All Winter

The skating at the Ravinia School rink was so much enjoyed during the whole period of good skating weather last week, that the committee in charge is making every effort to continue it throughout the winter.
